### **Albany County Fair Requirements**

All rabbits shown at Albany County Fair must have a permanent tattoo in their left ear. Ink pen or marker tattoos are not acceptable on rabbit entries. If you need help tattooing your rabbits, please contact Freda Dixon, and she will help you get your animals tattooed. Rabbits for breeding classes must be owned by June 1, 2017. Does producing a meat pen must be owned by April 15, 2017. Rabbits under 6 weeks of age will not be permitted on the fairgrounds. If you plan on doing a meat pen or single fryers and do not have breeding stock, you may want to purchase them soon.

### Rabbit Meat Pen and Single Fryer for 2017

Rabbits must be 70 days or less in age as of show day. The rabbits must weigh between 3-1/2 and 5-1/2 pounds in weight on show day. You are limited to two entries per exhibitor. Each exhibitor will be allowed to sell one meat pen at the Albany County Livestock Sale if the judge deems the pen "marketable". The limit of two animals of different species per consignor is still in effect.

### **Rabbit Leases**

Have you ever wanted to know more about rabbits? You may want to try leasing a rabbit from May to August or longer. You can learn about rabbits and show it at the Albany County Fair. There are rabbit breeders who are willing to do this for 4-Hers. Contact Freda Dixon 742-0506 for more information.

### 4-H Shooting Sports National **Championship 2017 WELCOME!**

Each year, Wyoming 4-H shooting sports members (14 -18 years old) have the opportunity to be a representative at the National 4-H Shooting Sports Invitational. The 2017 4-H Shooting Sports National Championships will be held June 25 - June 30 in Grand Island, Nebraska at the Heartland Public Shooting Park. The event is hosted by Nebraska 4-H. 4-H youth from across the country will compete in compound archery, recurve archery, air rifle, air pistol, .22 rifle, .22 pistol, shotgun, muzzleloading, and hunting skills. The selection process occurs by completing the application and submitting it to the State 4-H Office no later than April 30th. Adults are also needed to chaperone youth participants and the same selection process occurs. Please contact the Wyoming State 4-H Office at 4-H@uwyo.edu or 307-766-3430 for more infor-

### **Record Book Corner**

Have questions regarding the importance of completing your record book, how to fill out your record book, or even how to write appropriate goals, or anything about the 4-H record book? Record Book Clinic will be in the Meeting Room in the Extension Office at the fairgrounds on Wed, April 5 from 7-8 pm. Meeting is open to youth and adults. Feel free to bring your record book and any questions you have.

### Helps with Section 1:

Are your goals appropriate for your age and experience in a project? Think about what you really want to do in and with the project? It can be helpful to think of the big picture or a long term goal first....I want to cook a 5 course meal for my family, I want to be able to sew my own clothes, I want to ride my horse in a trail ride competition. Then think what you already know, then what you do NOT know. Your first goal may be to research (what are common first courses, what are the best materials to use for the first item you want to make, what are the rules for a competition). Then you need to think about other things you need to do to meet the long term goal. Do you need to learn different cuts of meat or how to broil meat, how to use a serger, or learn more stitches, practice riding at a canter for 10 minutes straight, get your horse to cross a creek? Theses can then be your goals Examples of goals: Learn 3 different cuts of beef this year; Broil 1 menu item; Learn 2 advantages to using a serger versus hand stitching; Learn two stitches to use on cotton material; Ride at a canter for 15 minutes straight 2 times a week; Determine if I and my horse meet the qualifications to compete in the beginning level of the summer trail competition. These are all things you can do/have control over and are measurable (remember SMART goals: Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic and Trackable (or time sensitive).

You need to think about what you ultimately want to do and the steps you need to take to help you do that thing/task. That thinking about what you want to accomplish helps you plan what you need to do so you can then go and do and then accomplish. 
### Exhibition & Show Swine Import Requirements

As a reminder, it is a state of Wyoming and a federal (USDA-APHIS) rule that all swine entering the state must be officially identified, must have a certificate of veterinary health inspection and a WLSB entry permit before coming into Wyoming. Compliance with these rules is mandatory for all importers of swine, and violations will be addressed. WLSB import requirements can be found on the WLSB website at: <a href="http://soswy.state.wy.us/Rules/RULES/8634.pdf">http://soswy.state.wy.us/Rules/RULES/8634.pdf</a>

All swine must have a certificate of veterinary inspection, issued in the previous thirty (30) days, showing a permit obtained from the Wyoming Livestock Board, within the previous ten (10) days. All swine imported will be placed under quarantine on the farm of destination for a Pseudorabies re-test to be completed within thirty (30) to sixty (60) days after import. Wyoming will not accept swine that have moved through more than one market in the last thirty (30) days prior to arrival in Wyoming.

All swine must be individually identified with ear tags, breed association-approved ear notches to tattoos are acceptable identification for purebred breeding swine. Brucellosis: Swine for exhibition purposes entering Wyoming must originate directly from a validated Brucellosisfree herd or state, or if over 3 months of age, be negative to the Brucellosis card test within thirty (30) days prior to date of entry (test must be by state -- federal approved laboratory). Pseudorabies: Swine for exhibition purposes must originate from a Qualified Pseudorabies Negative Herd or Stage 5 or 4 state and further, must be transported directly from the Qualified Pseudorabies premise or Stage 5 or 4 with no stops, drop-offs, pick-ups, at any site that is not a Qualified Pseudorabies Negative premises and will be quarantined on arrival for Pseudorabies re-test thirty (30) to sixty (60) days from date of entry. Swine not originating from a qualified Pseudorabies negative herd stage 4 or 5 state, must be tested for Pseudorabies within thirty (30) days prior to entry and will entry Wyoming under quarantine and isolation from all other swine for re-test no sooner than thirty (30) days and no longer than sixty (60) days from date of entry.

NOTE: All swine brought into the state for purpose of resale for 4-H and FFA projects will be quarantined to the person holding the sale, or the Wyoming individual importing the animals. It is the responsibility of the sale management or the importer to notify this office with complete names and addresses of all buyers and the swine's destination. This information will also include the individual identification of the swine received. After this office receives the above information and after all swine are accounted for, the notice of quarantine will be lifted from sale management or the original importer. New quarantines will be issued to the new buyers.




### PIG SELECTION

There are basic areas that need to be considered when selecting your show pig. They are muscle, structural correctness, capacity, frame and style and balance.

### Muscle

There are several indicators of muscle in pigs. The first place to look for muscle is the ham. The widest portion should be through the center of rump and ham. Select a pig that has a bulging forearm. Well muscled hogs are wide based and large boned.

When viewed from the top look for an hour glass shape to the top. This will be a trim, heavy muscled hog. It should be long and full in the rump, with the center of the ham being the widest part of the body. The shoulders should be wider than the loin, but not as thick as the ham. The loin will be uniform in width. When the hog walks there should be no evidence of fat over the top of the shoulders and the shoulders should move. Also, there should be no fat behind the shoulders or elbow pocket.




### Structural Correctness

Structural correctness refers to how a pig's skeleton is put together, more specifically the bone structure. To be sure your pig is structurally correct, pick a pig that moves with ease and smoothness. Pigs should take long strides. They also should have a proper angle to the pasterns and have flex to the joints like the hock, knee and shoulder. These joints should flex and the pig should take a long, flexible, fluid stride.

The pasterns should have an angle of 45 degrees and the hock should be at about a 22 degree angle for the best possible movement off the back end. Strong legs are important in market hogs. The bone should be large and the legs should be clean and solid looking.








Poor hind leg structure

### Capacity

Pigs need to have adequate capacity to allow their internal organs to function property and efficiently. They need to have a wide chest floor, a good spring of rib, and be deep sided in both the fore and rear flank. Remember that a deep sided hog can still be trim and neat in appearance.

### **Frame**


A moderate framed hog will grow well and have adequate size. Select a long bodied, tall hog that stands well on its feet and legs. It should be large boned and show a lot of capacity, being boldly sprung at the ribs.



### **Style and Balance**

A hog that has style and balance is one that holds its head up when it walks, and is smooth in its overall appearance. It will be clean in the shoulder blades, jowl and underline. Hogs that are balanced stand wide and tall on straight legs, are uniform in the arch of their back, and their shoulder blades are close together.


Select a trim hog that is free of excess fat. Fat gives the appearance of smoothness and shortness. A trim hog is clean behind the shoulders and down the top. The base of the ham should be firm, at the base of the hams (cut up or  $v \square$  shaped) with the tail setting high, and the tailhead prominent.

### Market Goat Selection

The selection of a goat for a project is one of the most important decisions made by a feeder. The type of goat you select at the beginning of the project will have a major influence on the results at the end of the project. However, one must remember that a winning goat is a combination of good selection, good nutritional management, proper grooming, and outstanding showmanship.

People differ in their ability to select prospective animals. Some have a natural eye for selecting young animals, while others never develop this ability. Do not hesitate to take advantage of a person with these skills. It may be your county agent, FFA instructor, parents, or another leader in the county. Also, many breeders are willing to assist you in your selection program.

When selecting young goats one must be conscious of age and fat thickness. Young goats that are bloomy and fat always look good, while young goats that are thin do not look as good. Learn to look past fat and recognize muscle so that you can pick those goats that are genetically superior.

Anytime you purchase goats, it is important to know a little about the producer you are buying from. Do not hesitate to ask questions about their goat's bloodlines and the age of the goats in question. When selecting goats there are five major areas of emphasis that need to be considered. They are structural correctness, muscle, volume and capacity, style and balance, and growth potential.

### Structural Correctness

Structural correctness refers to the skeletal system or bone structure of an animal. Goats should be upheaded, with the neck extending out of the top of the shoulders. Goats should travel and stand wide and straight on both their front and rear legs, and their legs should be placed squarely under the body. They should have a strong level top, and a long rump with a slight slope from their hooks to their pins. Goats should be heavy boned and be strong on their pasterns. Open shouldered, weak pasterned, steep rumped goats should be avoided.

### Muscle

Generally, goats that walk and stand wide are going to be heavier muscled. Goats should have a deep, heavily muscled leg and rump, with the widest part of the leg being the stifle area, when viewed from behind. They should have a broad, thick back and loin that is naturally firm and hard handling. Goats should be wide through their chest floor, with bold shoulders and a prominent forearm muscle. The chest and forearm of a goat are the best indicators of muscling in thin goats.

### **Volume and Capacity**

Volume and capacity refers to the relationship of length of body with depth of body and width of body. Goats should be long bodied, with adequate depth and spring of rib. Try to avoid selecting goats that are short bodied, narrow based, and flat ribbed.

### Style and Balance

Style and balance refers to the way all body parts blend together, how the shoulder blends into the rib cage, the rib cage to the loin, the loin to the rump, and how eye-appealing a goat is. When viewed from the side, a goat should be smooth shouldered, level topped, trim middled, and straight legged. A goat that is balanced, pretty, and holds his head up, is the first one you notice when you walk in the pen.

### **Growth Potential**

The ability of an animal to grow rapidly is very important. Generally, the larger framed goats, as indicated by a long head, neck, cannon-bone, and body, will grow faster, be larger, and more competitive in the show ring.

### **SHOW LAMB SELECTION**

### **MUSCLE**

Select show lambs with good expression of muscle. Pick a lamb that has firm, hard muscle tone in the legs, loin, and rump, where the higher priced cuts are located. Look for muscle from different views and areas.

### From the Rear

Leg -The widest portion should be through the center of the leg or stifle area. A larger outside muscle right above the stifle joint is very desirable. A muscular lamb will stand and walk wide. This requires good development of inside leg muscle. A lamb can stand wide and not have a lot of inside muscle. They may just be structurally wide. Be sure to check for inside muscle.


**Top** -A lamb needs to be wide across the top. The loin needs to be large and muscular. Look for a large rib cage which indicates a lot of capacity. Width is an indicator of muscle. However, be sure to feel your lamb to be certain that it is not fat. Feel down the back bone to determine the expression of the loin muscle. A good indicator of muscle is when you can feel a groove down the top of young lambs. This is like feeling the groove between your fingers when they are close together.



### From the Side AB

Choose a lamb that has proper length in the areas of the higher priced cuts, legs, loin and rump. The back portion of the top or hind saddle (B) should be longer than the front part, rack or back (A). To calculate this, measure from the last two ribs to the pin bones, (where the tail connects to the body).

This should be two or more inches longer that the front part, depending on the lamb's size. Length of the loin is important. Measure from the last two ribs to the hook bone. Length and width of the loin are important. Short bodied, compact animals are undesirable. Be careful not to get carried away with length. If you select a lamb that is too long it may be weak topped.



### From the Front

A bulging muscle from the knee to the shoulder is desirable. Large bone circumference of the cannon bone is a gauge of muscle, too. The larger the bone, the more area there is to attach muscle to. Select a lamb with a relatively long, thick cannon bone. The shoulder should be slightly prominent. Avoid getting a lamb with too large a shoulder as this will take away from a smooth, balanced appearance.

### STRUCTURAL CORRECTNESS

Show lambs should be correct in their skeletal or bone structure. The lamb's neck should be erect and extend out of the top of the shoulder. The top line should be long, level and straight. The legs should have a large circumference or diameter of bone. Its pasterns should be strong, and it should stand with its feet and legs wide apart. When it walks it should move with long, smooth steps, and track out wide. Do not select lambs that are open shouldered, weak topped and have steep rumps.

### **STYLE AND BALANCE**

These two characteristics describe how a lamb blends together. The front and rear ends should match. Looking at the lamb from the side view, it should have a clean, trim chest. The shoulder should be smooth while the top line should be long and level. A trim middle is desirable. Because lambs are shown with less than 1/4 inch wool, it is desirable that they have a tight, wrinkle-free hide. The most noticeable lamb in a pen holds its head up and looks long and straight with a level hip. Its walk is proud and wide based with a thick leg.

### **LOOK FOR POTENTIAL**

Select a lamb that shows good potential. Large framed, long bodied lambs, with a long neck, cannon bone, and thick loin show the most potential for growth. Lambs that are long in the loin and level in the rump have an advantage over others in the show ring.

# Livestock Quality Assurance

All 4-H members who plan on selling any market animal at the 4-H Livestock Sale during fair are required to take Quality Assurance classes. Class topics cover areas of appropriate care and handling of animals and how this impacts product quality. This year we are offering an online option through the University of Nebraska as well as two face-to-face classes in Laramie. **All training must be completed by the fair entry deadline of July 14<sup>th</sup>.** 

A youth must take it once in each 4-H age group they are registered in (once as a Junior 8-10, once as an Intermediate 11-13, once as a Senior 14-18). Ages are based on the youth's 4-H age (age as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the 4-H year: The age the youth was on January 1, 2017).

Information on the class options are below. If you have a question about what classes you have completed, what option would be best for you, or what your 4-H age is please email or call the Extension Office.

### **Online Option**

- There is a \$5 fee per youth per class to use this option. You must pay this fee to register for the class. You can use a credit or debit card or there is an option to pay by check. There are no refunds for youth who complete classes in the wrong age group.
- Each youth will need to complete the class individually, completing as a group is not an option because the program tracks each youth individually. Youth will be directed to complete at least three modules for the class to be considered complete.
- Each youth will need their own email address.
- Print off your completion certificates and keep them for your records. The Albany County Extension office will get a record of all classes completed but it's always good to have your certificates.


