Reading/Approval of Minutes were not approved because of the lack of attendance.

Treasurer Report: Sara reported balances in each account. First Interstate account is \$11,942.04, American National Bank account is \$3,395.25, Endowment is \$3,111.73 and Foundation is \$22,854.87.

Correspondence: None to report.

Youth Presentation: Rylie Heggie and Josh Schultz will be going on the Raton Shooting Trip. They are asking for Council to support them with financial cost. It was proposed to give them each \$150, Mindy Vohland moved to accept, seconded by Leah Churches.

WHY DO RECORD BOOKS?

Record books are due Oct 5th! Did you feel a push to complete your book, to maybe even write goals and "meet" them to get your book turned in? Start writing your goals for the 2018-2019 4-H year NOW! The first step to success is making goals. So make those goals and write them down, another proven method to help insure goals are met. And start jotting down your plan to meet the goals. (Do you need to check out some library books, set up time with a leader/ mentor to ask questions about a project, etc.?) Then go ahead and start acting on that plan. It is okay to meet goals and record all the things involved (completing the section 1) before September or October of 2019!

The only skills necessary to help judge the books is the ability to read and write short notes. Judging record books is a great way to see what 4-H youth are doing, gain insight to how to keep better records and help make the best better by giving the youth feedback on what they are doing well and giving them suggestions on how to better their record books or even projects if you are able. A short training is provided on what to look for when judging books, and snacks and meals are provided too. The Jr. leaders have agreed to watch kids if adults need someone to do that for them so they can judge record books. They are available from 3:30-8 during record book judging. Each club is required to provide 2 people to help judge books, but more are welcome! Children aged 5 to 8 need to be involved in activities and learning experiences that are developmentally appropriate. Children in this age group typically are full of energy and willing to learn, and need educational materials designed for their specific abilities, needs and interests. In addition, activities and learning experiences should be geared to the informal settings offered by 4-H. Research indicates that competition at this age is not developmentally appropriate. It is important that 5 to 8 year olds be involved in activities where the risk of failure is minimized and the opportunity to experience success is maximized. Educational programs for 5 to 8 year olds should focus on cooperative learning. The participation and learning of the child should be the ultimate goal.







Five Steps to Good Conversation

Do you ever feel like you don't know what to say? Or like you're always saying the wrong thing? Do you have trouble starting conversations or keeping them going? Follow these steps to build your talking skills.

- Act interested by asking questions.
- 2. Listen to the answers.
- Make comments or ask follow-up questions.
- 4. Share something about yourself.
- 5. Watch to see how your listeners react.

The National Western Stock Show Catch-A-Calf Program is a great program de-

signed to promote youth development and understanding of the cattle industry. Applicants must be between the ages of 12 and 18 as of December 31, 2018 to apply. They must be enrolled in 4-H at the time of application. Successful catchers must have adequate facilities available to house their steer as they are responsible for the care, feeding, and handling of their animals. The applications to participate in this year's Catch-A-Calf program at the NWSS are available on line at: http://www.nationalwestern.com/livestock-shows/catch-a-calf-contest/

Albany County has many participants in this wonderful program. Applications are due December 1, 2018.

For those of you not familiar with the Catch-a-Calf program, here is short synopsis. Youth that apply compete in January at a NWSS rodeo performance for one of the 40 spots in the program. Those that are successful at catching return in May to pick-up their calf. The program has sponsors that fund the calf. However, youth are responsible for all other costs, including feeding, equipment, transportation, etc. As part of the program participants are required to write monthly letters to their sponsors and to maintain a record book. Youth and their steers return to show in the 2020 NWSS Catch-a-Calf show. The overall grand and reserve grand champion (based on showmanship, live placing, record books, sponsor relations, production, and an interview) qualify for the junior livestock auction.

While the program is open to any youth that meets the age qualifications, final approval to participate is based on the extension agent's recommendation. Please remember that these are ranch raised steers, not show steers, and can often times be a challenge for youth that either don't have livestock knowledge or do not have resources they are willing to go to for help. Also, please make sure they have access to facilities that are appropriate for steers that are not tame, whether at their house or someone they know. We do provide as much support as possible, and have resource people to help those extension agents less familiar with market steers, but much of the support falls on the extension agent. By signing the form you agree that not only is the participant qualified to do the program, but also that you will provide support for them, conduct project visits, and serve as a liaison between them and the NWSS. If you have a member that is interested in participating that may not have the financial resources available, I will gladly help you with an idea of expected expenses they need to be aware of.

Code Your World

This October, 4-H and Google will launch an exciting National Youth Science Day challenge, *Code Your World*, inviting kids to get involved in computer science (CS) through hands-on doing. The national NYSD celebration kicks off October 1, and coding events can take place all throughout October.

Code Your World is a four-part challenge that teaches kids ages 8-14 to apply CS to the world around them through hands-on activities. Developed by Google and West Virginia University Extension Service, it includes a computer-based activity on Google's CS First platform and three unplugged activities that bring coding to life through games and interaction.

- ★ Not act in a detrimental way to the 4-H Youth Development Program or in conflict with its policies or procedures.
- Not participate in the use of obscene and discriminatory language at any 4-H activity.
- ★ Not possess or use weapons, alcoholic beverages and/or illegal drugs (or be under the influence thereof) when involved in any 4-H event, meeting or activity.

Please review the importance of the Code of Conduct and the core values of the 4-H Youth Development Program as we begin a new 4-H year.

- A new automated password will be sent to the email address you provided along with instructions to login and reset your password.



In the PARTICIPATION screen you will add or delete Clubs and Projects for each individual.

- If you are unsure of which Club to choose, please select I Club Placement and we will help choose a club.
- If you select a new club remember to click the Add Chip Button to add it to your Club list.
- When finished with club selections click the Continue >> Button at the bottom.
 - You will be taken to the project tab where you can add or delete projects.
 - For returning members the years in project should automatically increase for projects you are continuing
 - Remember to click the Add Project button to add a project to the Project List.
 - You can delete a project by clicking the Edit button and then clicking the Delete button.
