RECIPE ON HOW TO GROW A GARDENER Sharon Lovejoy

Ingredients:

- 1. You
- 2. Enthusiasm
- 3. Storytelling
- 4. Wonder

Preparation:

- 1. Spend interwoven rather than parallel time together. No multi-tasking. Turn off your phone.
- 2. Be enthusiastic no matter what happens. Even disasters are for learning!
- 3. Start small. Nothing is more daunting to a child than a large plot to care for.
- 4. Go out daily and explore with a magnifying glass & stethoscope. Touch, smell & taste.
- 5. Write & draw on a journal. Record dates, discoveries, good memories & catastrophes.
- 6. Propagate from cutting. Sow and save seeds. The last true bargains!
- 7. Plant an array of natives to entice birds, bees, butterflies & provide habitats.
- 8. Thin diversity. Variety will keep your garden healthy and provide habitats.
- 9. Plant edibles. Share harvesting, prepping, preserving, cooking, and eating meals.
- 10. Avoid all poisons. Period.

Mix together ingredients. Let set. Watch carefully. Increase recipe as needed. Incorporate into your daily life. Don't be afraid to spice things up! Share with your friends, family, & neighbors. Enjoy the fruits of your labors – the next generation of gardeners.

The above was the hand-out for the class. She then expounded on each. She started with a quote by Richard Henry Dana (1815-1882) "He who dares to teach must never cease to learn" A few of the ideas she stressed were

Pay attention, Be astonished; Be present; Tell about it!

With children "you" are the most critical part of the garden.

Start small, maybe with containers.

She ended with "In heart be a child". Which could have been a quote by someone else, but I missed it.—submitted by Heather Kleiner, CCMG

Audrey and I took a class online with the Penn State Extension on "Botanical Illustration Photography for the Digital Age" given by Keith Adkins. Keith is a Master Gardener with McKean County Master Gardeners. He has been professional photographer for 30 years.

Mr. Adkins talked about four main factors in botanical photography: Subject, Composition, Lighting and Post Processing. Subject is the focus of your picture or primary object. Composition is how the photo is set up. The subject should be centered or just slightly off center and is best when the background is blurred. Lighting is the most important consideration. There are two types of lighting, flash and natural lighting. Natural lighting is best for botanical photography so he did not talk about flash except to say that it could be used to fill in the front of a picture that has the sun behind the subject. A flash in botanical photography oversaturated the subject with highlights and that is why it is not recommended by him. Overcast lighting is preferred over a sunny day because it provides more balanced light though he said that there might be a need to adjust for exposure levels either through camera settings or with help of a reflector. Early to mid-morning or evening sunlight are preferred. Mr. Adkins spent over half of his presentation talking about Post Processing. It is accomplished thru different programs on various operating systems and includes cell phone apps. He uses Adobe Lightroom and in the program he uses Exposure, Shadows, Clarity, Dehaze, and Vibrance. He has lots of before and after examples using each one.—submitted by Heather Kleiner, CCMG
