Objectives of the Campbell County Contests Event

- ✿ To provide opportunities for further development of 4-H members and cloverbuds.
- ✿ To give youth another opportunity to compete in various 4-H areas.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Entry Information:

- ✿ Pre-registration is due November 15th for Prepared Presentations, Table Setting, Family Life Photo, Cake Decorating, Avian Bowl Jeopardy, and Fabric and Fashion. It is highly recommended to pre-register for all contests, but not required for Dog Skill-A-Thon, Family Consumer Sciences, Meat Identification, Produce Identification, and Wool Judging to Kim.Fry@campbellcountywy.gov
- ✿ Members may compete in 1 or all contests.
- ✿ Age Divisions: Ages as of January 1, 2023
 - Cloverbud Division—Age 5-7
 - Junior Division—Age 8-10
 - Intermediate Division—Age 11-13
 - Senior Division—Age 14-18
- ✿ Contestants must be in good standing with 4-H.

General:

- ✿ There are contests where all contestants will need to be available at the stated time. The other contests are classified as floating contests where contestants can come at any time.
- ✿ Please come to contests at least 15 minutes prior to the beginning time for registration.

- ✿ Contestants may bring pencils, blank notebook, blank paper, clip board, and/or rubber bands if they choose.
- ✿ These exhibits must be new and not previously presented at Campbell County Contests.
- ✿ There will be no electronic devices in the contest areas including cell phones or watches.
- ✿ No talking will be allowed during contest times. This includes communication between contestants and adults. If assistance is needed, contest leads will be available.
- ✿ No touching and/or rough handling of contest materials. This may result in disqualification.
- ✿ If there are questions, please contact us prior to the event, ask the contest leads, or room monitor. We want this event to not only be competitive, but educational. If contestants are wanting to learn, the committee will work to assist.

The CCC Committee reserves the right to make changes and/or update rules as needed.

AWARDS

- ✿ All contestants are encouraged to attend the awards program on Saturday, November 19th at 3pm.
- ✿ Each contest will have ribbons for the sections in the Junior, Intermediate, and Senior age groups. Rosettes will be given to the overall age group winners.
- ✿ Participation awards will be given to Cloverbuds.

AVIAN BOWL JEOPARDY

Saturday, November 19th — Judging anytime between 9am-11am

Contest Rules:

- ✿ Individuals will answer 2 rounds of 6 questions geared towards respective age groups.
- ✿ Individuals will use a buzzer to “buzz” in before answering their questions. First person to “buzz” in will answer first. If answer is incorrect, the second person who “buzzed” in has a chance to answer the question, and so on. The question may be repeated for the remainder of the individuals who haven’t answered.
- ✿ Questions will be on Breed ID, Comb ID, Nutrition, Medication, Anatomy, and from the Fair book.
- ✿ Breeds may not be APA standard breeds. Identification could be anything from backyard to APA and anything in between.

Scoring:

- ✿ Scoring will be as it is in Jeopardy with 100, 200, 300, 400, and 500 points possible on questions.
- ✿ In an event of a tie, challenge questions will be asked.

CAKE DECORATING

Must Pre-Register by Wednesday, November 15th!

Saturday, November 19th – 9am-11am Contest for 4-H Members – 11am-Noon Cloverbuds

Contest Rules:

- ✿ Contestants must use 8” round or square cake, no more than 2 layers. Only baked cakes will be accepted, contestants must also provide 1 cupcake to decorate for tasting.
- ✿ Contestants must bring recipe, no box mixes allowed. Frosting must be made from scratch. No store bought frosting.
- ✿ Contestants must provide ALL equipment necessary to complete their creation – i.e. tools, tips, bags, stamps, coloring, specialty icing, frosting, fondant, utensils, etc. The final cake with toppings need to be edible.
- ✿ This will be a themed event, the theme will be announced at the contest.
- ✿ Proper food safety practices will be encouraged and included in evaluations by judges.

Scoring:

- ✿ Based on recipe and taste, preparation, and final cake.
- ✿ Finished cakes will be judged and then put on display for people’s choice.

DOG SKILL-A-THON

Saturday, November 19th — Judging anytime between 8am-2pm

Contest Rules:

- ✿ The contest will consist of three parts: breed identification, parts of a dog, and a skill-a-thon.
- ✿ **Breed identification:** Contestants will be required to name the breed and group in which the dog belongs. Only AKC recognized breeds in the main seven recognized groups (Sporting, Non-Sporting, Toy, Terrier, Hound, Working, and Herding) will be used.
- ✿ **Parts of a Dog:** consists of identifying the correct parts, internal organs, and skeletal structure of a dog.
- ✿ **Skill-a-thon (hands-on).** Contestants will be asked questions, scenarios or identify topics related to subject areas including show ring, anatomy (foot, foot bones, pads and phalanges), breed specific information (images and traits), animal care and management (behavioral postures, parasites, muzzling, bathing, nail trimming, lifting, health care, licensing, and records), conformation (bites, ears, and eyes; feet, pasterns, and stifles; front and rear legs and tails), equipment (care and grooming) and facility management (safety and sanitation issues). The Dog Learning Laboratory Kit through the Ohio Agriculture Education Curriculum Materials Service will be used for this portion.
- ✿ The Wyoming State 4-H website has resources for members to prepare at <http://www.uwyo.edu/4-h/opportunities/state-contests/showcase-showdown/dog-skillathon.html>

Scoring:

- ✿ One point available for each item.
 - Cloverbuds identify 5 breeds, 5 parts, and 5 skill-a-thon items.
 - Juniors identify 10 breeds, 10 parts, and 10 skill-a-thon items.
 - Intermediates identify 15 breeds, 15 parts, and 15 skill-a-thon items.
 - Seniors & Adults identify 20 breeds, 20 parts, and 20 skill-a-thon items.
- ✿ Ties will be broken using the following sequence:
 - Breed identification
 - Parts of a Dog
 - Skill-A-Thon

FABRIC & FASHION/FASHION SHOW

Must Pre-Register by Wednesday, November 15th!

Saturday, November 19th —12pm-2pm Judging, 3pm Fashion Show

Contest Rules:

- ✿ Constructed- a complete outfit with all garments constructed by the participant unless considered an accessory.
- ✿ Constructed/Purchased (Sew & Buy)- A complete outfit consisting of at least one garment constructed by the participant with the remaining garments purchased or constructed by someone other than the participant.
- ✿ Any Other Sewn Items- Any item under 40” square. Examples: pillowcase, doll clothes, table runner, pillow.
- ✿ Participants may exhibit in more than one category, but only one outfit in each category.
- ✿ Judging will be pre-determined into timeslots.
- ✿ The Fashion Show is for fun, participants may decide which garment to model.

FAMILY AND CONSUMER SCIENCES SKILL-A-THON

Saturday, November 19th — Judging anytime between 8am-2pm

Contest Rules:

- ✿ The contest will reflect an overall general knowledge of family and consumer sciences area.

Scoring:

- ✿ The Contest consists of identifying items from a variety of fields within FCS. 1 point for each item correctly identified and 1 point for correct spelling.
 - Cloverbuds identify 5 items.
 - Juniors identify 10 items.
 - Intermediates identify 15 items.
 - Seniors identify 20 items.

 Friday, November 18th — Scheduled Judging between 4-8pm

Contest Rules:

- ✿ Enter only one photo, not a group of photos. Only one entry per exhibitor.
- ✿ Photo must represent family life where you live. The photo should have people in it doing something that portrays family life.
- ✿ Entrants are encouraged to use originality and creativity when taking these photos.
- ✿ The photo can be a developed color, black & white, digital print.
- ✿ Any size photo can be used with 8x10” being the max.
- ✿ Use the Wyoming 4-H hanging guidelines when mounting your photo.

Scoring:

- ✿ Judging will be based on the following scorecard:
 - Story telling ability 45 points
 - Composition 30 points
 - Photographic Quality 15 points
 - Mounting and Neatness 10 points
- ✿ Photos will be judged and then put on display for people’s choice.

HIPPOLOGY

Friday, November 18th — Beginning at 5pm @ GAMB (Registration at 4:45pm)

Contest Rules:

- ✿ The contest will consist of four parts: Examination, Station, Judging, and Team Problem. (Team will be exempt for this contest).
- ✿ Individuals should come prepared with a #2 pencil, notebook, and or clipboards.
- ✿ **Examination:** Total of 20 points for Junior/Intermediate and 30 points for Senior possible. Each question is worth 1pt. This phase will include:
 - Written exam
 - Slide exam
- ✿ **Station:** This phase will consist of a series of stations where all contestants will respond to the requirements of the station. Stations may include pictures or actual items. Senior contestants will be allowed 2.5 minutes at each station, Juniors/Intermediate will not have a time limit. Total of 20 points for Junior/Intermediate and 40 points for Senior possible with each station worth 10 pts. Stations may include, but are not limited to:
 - Various types of saddles (actual or pictures) and parts of saddles
 - Tack, bit, bridles, horseshoes, and parts of shoes
 - Tools and equipment, and assembly of specific parts of various pieces of equipment
 - Grains and forages used in equine rations, including various forms of methods of preparation
 - Internal and external parasites based on actual samples, pictures, life cycle charts, and/or damage caused
 - Blemishes and unsoundness
 - Age of equines based on teeth
 - Nutrition and health
 - Genetics & Reproduction
 - Use of pulse rate, respiration rate, temperature, dehydration, anemia, etc. to assess horse health
 - Measurements such as, but not limited to, wither height, shoe size, girth, collar size, gullet width, seat length of saddle, etc. may be required
- **Judging:** Total of 50 points, 50 points per class. Contestants will be required to place a class consisting of halter/conformation or performance. There will be no prohibition against contestant use of pre-printed materials during the judging portion, including rule books, patterns, and score sheets. For this contest video, pictorial, and/or classes especially prepared for the event may be used.

Scoring:

- ✿ Overall individual points possible:
 - Juniors/Intermediates: 90
 - Seniors: 120
- ✿ All ties overall, individual or team, will be broken using the following sequence:
 - Examination scores
 - Station scores
 - Judging scores

MEATS IDENTIFICATION

Saturday, November 19th — Judging anytime between 8am-2pm

Contest Rules:

- ✿ **Retail ID Rail:** 20 cuts total. Contestants will have 1 minute per cut for a total of 15 minutes on the line.
 - Properly naming Species 2 pt
 - Properly naming Primal Cut 3 pt
 - Properly naming Retail Cut 5 pt
- ✿ The Contest consists of:
 - Cloverbuds identify 5 cuts.
 - Juniors identify 10 cuts.
 - Intermediates identify 15 cuts.
 - Seniors identify 20 cuts.

PREPARED PRESENTATIONS CONTEST

Must Pre-Register by Wednesday, November 15th!
Friday, November 18th — Scheduled Judging between 4-8pm

Contest Rules:

- ✿ Must be a new presentation that has not been presented previously at other contests.
- ✿ The Presentations Contest emphasizes development of verbal communication skills.
- ✿ Presentation delivery may include, but is not limited to, demonstrations, interactive exhibits, skits, drama, public speaking, visual aids and/or multimedia displays.
- ✿ Contestants can be enrolled in any 4-H project and give a presentation on any topic. Returning contestants are welcome and simply need to present a different topic each year.
- ✿ Teams are considered one entry and share any awards.
- ✿ *Time Limits:*
 - Cloverbuds ~2-5 minutes
 - Juniors ~3-10 minutes
 - Intermediates ~ 5-10 minutes
 - Seniors ~ 7-15 minutes
 - Penalties apply for going over or under time limits. Set-up time and questions asked after the presentation concludes are not included in this time limit.
- ✿ Easels, tables, a laptop with the PowerPoint program, projector, and screen will be provided. *Contestants are responsible for bringing any electronic presentation materials (i.e. PowerPoint) on a USB drive to be used with the provided supplies at the event. A different laptop may be used in the event there are problems using those provided.*
- ✿ Contestants may arrive early so they have time to get set up. Proper food handling techniques are the responsibility of the individual.

Scoring:

- ✿ Presentations are judged on knowledge of subject matter, presentation manner and impact.

PRODUCE IDENTIFICATION

Saturday, November 19th — Judging anytime between 8am-2pm

Contest Rules:

- ✿ **Identification Line:** Contestants will identify produce varieties.
- ✿ Scoring will be based on properly identifying vegetables by either the general classifications or the specific variety correct for that item. Deductions will not be made for spelling errors.
- ✿ No touching of the items will be allowed so each contestant sees the displays in the same condition.
- ✿ The latest revision of the “4-H Produce Identification List” will be the authority to determine which products are used for identification.

Scoring:

- ✿ One point available for each item.
 - Cloverbuds identify 5 produce.
 - Juniors identify 10 produce.
 - Intermediates identify 15 produce.
 - Seniors & Adults identify 20 produce.
- ✿ Ties will be broken using spelling of Identification Line

TABLE SETTING CONTEST

Must Pre-Register by Wednesday, November 15th!
Friday, November 18th — Scheduled Judging between 4-8pm

Contest Rules:

- ✿ Contestant will be given a 24” x 24” exhibit space to display their place setting.
- ✿ Contestant will display a place setting that coordinates with the menu they planned. All dishes, table coverings and centerpieces will be provided by the contestant.
- ✿ Contestant will be interviewed by the judge about their place setting, menu and knowledge of nutrition.
- ✿ Menu will be planned to meet the nutritional needs of the 4-Her entered in the contest. Menus need to be on a 3x5 or 4x6 inch recipe card(s).
 - Cloverbud, Junior and Intermediate – Plan menu for one meal.
 - Senior - Plan menu for one day including snacks, pick one meal for table setting display.
- ✿ Place setting will include only dishes and flatware necessary for the menu.
- ✿ Centerpiece will be appropriate for table set for 4 people.
- ✿ Use the Wyoming 4-H guide as a reference <http://www.uwyo.edu/4-h/get-involved/contests/tablesetting/index.html>
- ✿ Place setting and menu must be the work of the individual member.
- ✿ Members will be given 15 minutes to setup their exhibit before being interviewed.

Scoring:

- ✿ Centerpiece: 20 points-Originality, color, theme coordination and principles of design
- ✿ Menu: 25 points-Balanced and follows current nutrition guideline, and age appropriate
- ✿ Overall Design: 25 points-Place setting is appropriate for occasion, colors and textures of dishes, utensils and mats, napkins coordinate, imagination and creativity
- ✿ Knowledge & Correct Procedure: 25 points-Vocabulary terms and correct placement of Appointments
- ✿ Time Management: 5 points-Completed within allotted time

WOOL JUDGING

Saturday, November 19th — Judging anytime between 8am-2pm

Contest Rules:

- ✿ **Wool Classes:** 1 Breed or Commercial Classes. Contestants will have 15 minutes per class. At the start of each class, contestants will view fleeces from a distance for 2 minutes before moving in to handle fleeces. Total of 100 points possible.
- ✿ There are to be no measuring devices in the judging area, including lined paper, rulers, marks on papers, hands or clipboards.
