Campbell County Master Gardeners Individual and Small Lot Item Descriptions

Although the species listed have proven adaptable to Wyoming conditions, each species may have limited adaptability to local soil types and conditions.

Fruit Trees

Apple, Cortland - One of the first McIntosh crosses, Cortland has a crimson skin with a white flesh with a slightly larger fruit than a MacIntosh. Heavy bearing and popular for fresh eating as it does not turn brown quickly when exposed to air. Requires another apple variety for pollination. Will grow 12-16 feet.

Apple, Crimson Crisp - This outstanding, scab free variety is shaded a beautiful blushed red while the creamy white flesh is crunchy and juicy. The balance of tart and sweet gives it a distinct, rich flavor. The tree is spreading and easy to maintain, making it an ideal tree for fruit growers and homeowners. Mature size 15' tall, 12'-15' spread.

Shrubs

Buffaloberry - A thorny, thicket forming, medium to tall shrub which may reach 12-15 feet in height. Abundant small, red, astringent fruits, makes great jelly. Tolerant of dry and alkaline or saline soils.

Caragana - Very hardy, upright shrub with a height of 12'-14' on favorable sites; drought and alkaline soil tolerant up to 9,500'; yellow flowers are followed by seed bearing pods; good wildlife species yet resists browsing by deer.

<u>Cherry, Western Sandcherry -</u> A small, winter-hardy, multi-stemmed, native shrub which can reach a height of 3-6 feet. Produces a dark purple to black edible fruit. Prefers loamy soil, ph 5-7.5. Needs 2 plants to pollinate and will cross pollinate with some plum varieties.

<u>Chokecherry, Common</u> - Large, suckering shrub native across the US; may be planted up to 8,000 feet; may reach a height of 15' and grows well on most sites, produces abundant small cherries suitable for jelly or wildlife, toxic to animals if seeds or forage is consumed.

<u>Currant, Black</u> - A native shrub species three to six feet tall with erect branches. Small flowers open in May and have five yellow petals. Produce glossy, red-purple to nearly black fruit in August-September. Ripe fruits are sweet and desirable for human consumption. Self pollinator.

<u>Currant, Golden -</u> An upright shrub with arching stems providing nesting cover for birds and wildlife reaching a height of 3-6 feet. Adaptive to variety of soil. Drought and saline tolerant. Native to the Midwest and Intermountain west. Fragrant yellow flowers produce a dark purple to black or purplish-brown fruit suitable for wildlife and jellies. Self pollinator.

<u>Dogwood, Redosier</u> - Medium sized, multi-stemmed, lightly suckering shrub which may reach a height of 7-10 feet. Likes moist, somewhat wet loam soil but adaptable to variety of soil. Stems are dark to bright red, white fruit clusters are taken rapidly by birds. Native to the northern and eastern United States and Canada.

<u>Lilac, Common</u> - Upright, suckering, medium to tall shrub which grows 8'-12' tall; purple or white flower colors; one of the better shrubs for windbreak purposes; plant to 8,500 feet; grows well in most soils.

<u>Lilac, Villosa</u> - a medium to large, dense, non-suckering, upright shrub native to northern China and Mongolia. Flowers are pink and villosa lilac blooms about 2 weeks later than common lilac. It may reach a height of 12 feet on favorable sites.

Plum, Prairie Red - Thicket-forming, thorny, medium to tall shrub reaching 8'-12' in height on favorable sites. White flowers appear in early May followed by edible yellow or red plums of variable size in late summer and fall.

<u>Sumac, Smooth</u> - Medium to large, suckering, open shrub reaching 10 to 20 feet in height and forming colonies. The pinnately compound leaves turn orange to red-orange in the fall, fruit clusters are dry and persist well into winter. This plant is similar to smooth sumac but larger in size. Native to the northeast and central U.S.

Trees

Ash, Green - a medium to large straight trunked tree reaching 35 to 50 feet in height. Tolerant of wet or dry soil conditions, pH adaptable. Native across the eastern and central United States.

Cottonwood, Siouxland - Tall, fast growing, plant in moist soils or in areas with supplemental water below 6,000 feet.

Crabapple, Dolgo - Beautiful white flowers in the spring, has red fruit, can reach 40 feet in height with 25 foot spread.

Crabapple, Midwest -A small to medium sized, round headed tree reaching a height of 15 to 25 feet. It is native from northeastern Asia to northern China. White flowers appear in May followed by yellow or red fruits in October.

Linden, American - A medium to large pyramidal tree, becoming oval to spreading when mature, can reach 50'-70' in height, large, broadly ovate leaves 4 to 6 inches in length and width.

Maple, Amur - A large, multi-stemmed small tree native to northern Asia which may reach 15-20 feet in height and spread. Noted for its attractive autumn color of yellow, orange, or red.

<u>Oak, Burr</u> - a medium to large, adaptable, long-lived tree with a wide, spreading crown which may reach a height of 40-60 feet on favorable sites. Produces acorns which are utilized by a wide variety of wildlife. It is native across the eastern and midwestern United States.

Willow, Golden - A large low-branching tree forming a broad round-topped crown with slender, drooping branches. Brought over from Europe and central Asia. Widely planted as a yard tree. Its branches shed easily throughout the season.

Evergreens

Black Hills Spruce - Large tree to 30-60' tall and 15-25' wide, fairly drought resistant.

Colorado Blue Spruce - Tall tree to 60', slight blue color, on most soils but will grow on drier sites if watered for establishment, to 9,500 feet.

Eastern Red Cedar - Medium tree to 18' tall, on most soils in the plains below 6,000 feet; drought resistant when established, good windbreak species.

Ponderosa Pine - 40'-50' tall, on most soils of low pH except heavy clay, up to 8,500 feet; one of the best windbreak trees.

Rocky Mountain Juniper - Medium tree 15-18' tall, does well on most soils; 8,000 feet; drought resistant when established; excellent windbreak.

Fruit Plants

Raspberry, Joan J - High yielding, thornless, early primocane raspberry. Berries are red, large and firm, easy to pick and have good flavor.

<u>Raspberry, Nova</u> - Nova is a consistently dependable red raspberry plant with high yields.
