4-H WILDLIFE & HUNTING

This area within 4-H covers a large area of programming. In this project, you can learn how to identify, track and characterize game birds and animals; how to become a good, safe and lawful hunter; how to conserve and improve habitats; and the basic concepts of taxidermy.



WHO ARE YOU?

Did you know that owls have unique vision called binocular vision. Supplies: Paper plate, 2 toilet paper tube, scissors, glue, brown and yellow paint

1.Cut out the paper plate by drawing the lines above (lower 1/3 drawn into thirds). Trace the location of those eye holes. 2. Cut out the drawn lines. 3. Paint the pieces and let dry. 4. Cut one end of each of the tubes with four slits up 1/3 the tube, fold over. 5. Glue the beak and ears onto the head. 6. Glue the flaps onto the back of the plate. You may need to cut the flap down to not stick outside of the head.

COLOR ME!!!

Supplies: Large open pinecones, Peanut Butter, String, Birdseed 1.Cut out a piece of string and tie to the top of your pinecone. Tie the ends of the twine together to make a loop. 2. Place a scoop of peanut butter, about a tablespoon, on a plate or paper towel. Spread onto the pinecone, making sure you get a little bit on the pinecone scales, 3. Roll pinecone until the peanut butter is completely covered with birdseed. 4. Hang outside! It's fun to watch the different birds that come for a snack!








Draw a line from each animal to its tracks.

GET INVOLVED IN CITIZENSHIP AND SERVICE

Build bird houses and feeders for your local park to attract all kinds of wild birds.

Clean up parks, streams, and lakes to keep wildlife habitats healthy.

Participate in a Game and Fish wildlife count.

LEARN ABOUT LEADERSHIP

Invite a Game and Fish warden to speak at your club meeting.

Hold a workshop to teach others environmentally friendly ways to make wildlife feeders.

Teach others about hunting safety
