4-H Enrollment Fee Information



There is a \$15 registration fee assessed per youth beginning this 4-H year. The registration fee will cover the State 4-H insurance fees and will provide funds for 4-H programming for the coming 4-H year. There will be scholarships available for those in need. Payment process as of right now is payment by check or cash to Carbon County 4H. A check is preferred, however you can pay with cash if you do not have checks. You will notice that payment says County/Club Check, all this means is payment will be made by check or cash. We are looking into payment by card but that process is not setup yet. We will release that information as soon as we have it. Please contact us with any questions or concerns.

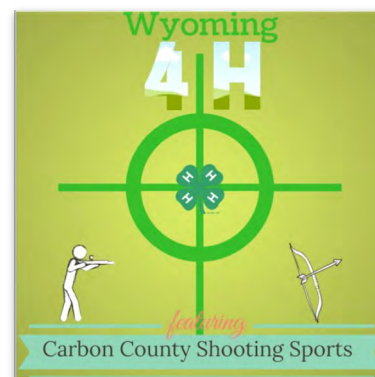
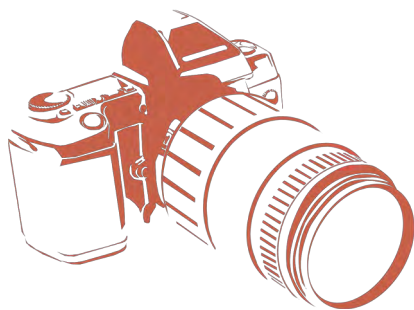

Youth Volunteer Service Recognition- Prudential Spirit of Community Award

Students in grades 5-12 who have volunteered in the past year are eligible for honors at the local, state and national level. Top honorees earn monetary awards and all-expense-paid trips with a parent or guardian to Washington, D.C. for special recognition events.

The Prudential Spirit of Community Awards – the largest youth recognition program in the U.S. based exclusively on volunteer service – is sponsored by Prudential Financial in partnership with the National Association of Secondary School Principals. A number of 4-H members have earned state-level recognition from the program in recent years.

Here's how your chapter can participate:

Now through **November 7, 2017**, youth volunteers can apply at <http://spirit.prudential.com> and www.nassp.org/spirit.

- Members must complete their applications and submit certification materials to your executive officer by **November 7**.
- Then, your chapter can select one Local Honoree for every 1,000 members (or portion thereof) in grades 5-8, and one for every 1,000 members (or portion thereof) in grades 9-12.
- Once Local Honorees have been selected, executive officers have until **November 17, 2017 to certify their applications online for state-level judging**.

All state-level honorees will receive special recognition, and top youth volunteers are eligible for monetary awards and all-expense-paid trips to Washington, D.C. for several days of special recognition events.

Wyoming 4-H Member Achievement Program

The achievement program is designed to recognize youth members' continued involvement in the Wyoming 4-H Program. Youth between the ages of 8 and 18 can receive annual recognition based on their efforts. The annual recognition categories are listed below:

Green Membership Recognition = 0 points

- Member has turned in all required enrollment materials
- Member has behaved in an appropriate manner at all 4-H activities, events, and meetings
- Member is enrolled in at least one project
- Member is enrolled in at least one club or has approval of County 4-H Educator

Silver Recognition = 1 point

- Member meets Membership Recognition criteria outlined above
- Member has exhibited what he/she has learned at some point in the current 4-H year
- Member provides documentation (usually using a 4-H Portfolio) of setting goals, knowledge/skills gained, and participation in project, participation in 1 Educational Opportunity, Participation in 1 Community Service.

Gold Recognition = 3 points

- Member meets Membership Recognition criteria outlined above
- Member has exhibited what he/she learned at some point in the current 4-H year
- Member provides documentation with a complete 4-H Portfolio, showing participation in all essential elements of positive youth development: setting goals, knowledge/skills gained, recognition, leadership, 1 community service, and participation in project and 1 Educational Opportunity (Most likely via the portfolio.)

Honors Club

The ultimate achievement a 4-H member can obtain is induction into the Wyoming 4-H Honors Club achieved by receiving nineteen (19) points over the course of the member's involvement. A member receives three (3) points for each year in which Gold Recognition is achieved and one (1) point for each year Silver Recognition is achieved. Points are evaluated and recorded through the local County 4-H Program. Once a member achieves 19 or more points they will receive a certificate and a pendant/pin recognizing them as members of the Wyoming 4-H Honors Club. This recognition can be listed on college applications, scholarships, etc. to show the youth's commitment and drive.

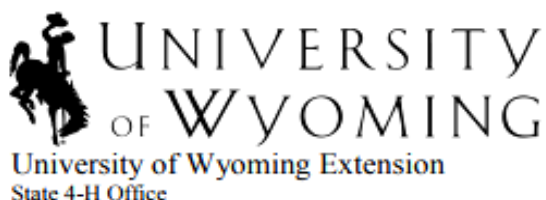

Dear Future 4-H Volunteer Leader,

Thank you for your interest in volunteering for the University of Wyoming Extension 4-H Youth Development Program. Your involvement and dedication ensure the mission of 4-H happens in Wyoming, "*4-H empowers youth to reach their full potential, working and learning in partnership with caring adults*". We have over 7,000 youth enrolled in the Wyoming 4-H program and our highest priority is creating a safe emotional and physical environment in which the members can learn and grow. That is accomplished through training designed especially for volunteer leaders as well as background checks of adults who have direct interaction with our 4-H members.

To begin the process of becoming a Wyoming 4-H volunteer please go to our online enrollment portal and create a profile. The web address is <http://www.uwyo.edu/4-h/>. This is the first step in the Leader Certification Process.

Once you have a profile on 4-H online you will receive THREE e-mail. One will ask you to complete the background check this is done through SterlingBack. The subject line will read: *4-H Volunteer Screening Instructions*. The second will ask you to complete the Motor Vehicle Record (MVR) check. The third will provide you with a web address to complete an initial volunteer training process.

Screening of the **criminal background check** conducted through the UW Department of Human Resources will include convictions of child endangerment, crimes of a sexual nature, felony involving violence, and financial crimes. Individuals who have ever been convicted of a crime against children or a vulnerable adult, a crime of a sexual nature, or a felony involving violence will not be approved as a 4-H volunteer leader. All information gathered in the screening process is considered private and will remain confidential and will only be released as required by law.

To protect your privacy and ensure confidentiality, both the criminal background check and the MVR will be completed on-line by yourself. Your personal information will not be kept in the County Extension Office.

After all three of these pieces have been completed you will receive a letter from the State 4-H Office introducing you to your county program. The final step in the New Leader Certification process will be to meet with your county staff. Each county may have a different way of doing this. Your meeting may include a one-on-one training or a group training. Once this is completed your county will accept your enrollment on 4-H online and you will be an approved volunteer.

After the initial approval, a 4-H volunteer leader is required to participate in additional training every 5 years that will benefit your role in 4-H. There are many methods and/or opportunities to receive the training.

If you do not have access to internet, please contact the County Extension Office about options to create a profile in 4-HOnline and complete the consent form for the background checks.
