

4-H Youth/Volunteer Enrollment Process

FOR EXISTING MEMBERS

- Go to <http://wyoming.4honline.com> You will see a screen like this.
- As an existing Member/Family that is re-enrolling for the next 4-H year select the first option I have a profile
 - Enter your email address and password you used to create your Family login and click the **Log In** button

- Once you are logged in you can review your Family info and update it if needed by clicking the **Edit Family** button
 - In the **MEMBER LIST** tab, please look at the **Member/Volunteer List** to view the members/adult volunteers associated with your family account.
 - Please do not add a new individual that is already listed in the member/volunteer list!
 - To Re-Enroll for the new 4-H year click on the **Edit** button to the right of each name
 - Review the information displayed in the Personal Information screen.
 - At the Bottom of the page on the right you will click the **Enroll for 2015-2016** button.
 - On the next page you can review/update the personal information page.
 - The red asterisk * indicates required fields
- You will now continue through several tabs verifying/updating information. To advance to the next screen click the **Continue >>** button.

- In the **PARTICIPATION** screen you will add or delete Clubs and Projects for each individual.
- If you are unsure of which Club to choose, please select **1 Club Placement** and we will help choose a club.
 - If you select a new club remember to click the **Add Club** Button to add it to your Club list.
 - When finished with club selections click the **Continue >>** Button at the bottom.
 - You will be taken to the project tab where you can add or delete projects.
 - For returning members the years in project should automatically increase for projects you are continuing
 - Remember to click the **Add Project** button to add a project to the Project List.
 - You can delete a project by clicking the **Edit** button and then clicking the **Delete** button.
 - When you are finished with club and project selections click the **Submit Enrollment** Button.

AS WE START A NEW 4-H YEAR

Basic Criteria of a Strong Club:

- At least five youth members from two or more families who feel welcome and a part of the club.
- Six or more club meetings during the 4-H year that are planned and well thought out.
- The club has a program plan with goals for the year.
- The club has well planned meetings with three parts: business, education and group building activities (recreation).
- Members have the main responsibility for planning programs and activities with adult guidance and accountability.
- At least 90 percent of the members attend each meeting.
- Each member's parents participate in the club meetings or activities at least once a year.
- Enrolled, active adult volunteers
- The club plans and completes at least one community service learning project.
- Members are involved in county, state and/or national 4-H opportunities
- Recognition of individual & group accomplishments

Tips for a Successful Club

- **Choose a REGULAR meeting day, time, and place:** moving meetings around to fit club whims may work in the short term but long term it will leave members confused & they stop coming
- **Hold Meetings OFTEN:** at least once every two months for maximum learning and productivity
- **Balance Work and Play:** every meeting should include social time, business should be run by club officers with adult input, and even a 10 minute presentation by a club member on their project teaches club members something
- **Encourage Variety & Member-made Decisions:** different things happen throughout the year that you can focus on, don't let every meeting be the same; help make your club members decide what the club does, guide them in sound decisions and following through on those decisions!

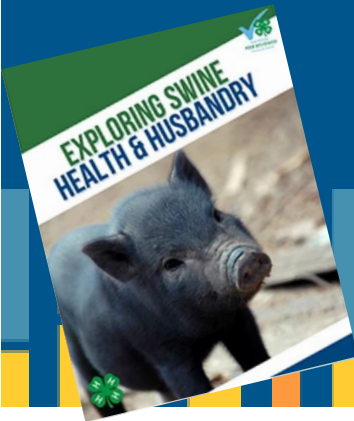

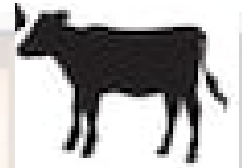

Selecting Show Cattle—Tips from Texas A&M Extension

Probably one of the most important factors to consider in selecting beef cattle for show is to select from reputable breeders of quality cattle. With this in mind, your next step is to select animals that are the right age, size and weight for your particular show. Getting down to the basics of qualities that good show prospects should possess, I feel the first thing one should look for is structural correctness.

☐ Show cattle should have straight legs – both fore and hind legs. If the legs are not straight at the beginning of the feeding period, they will get worse as their weight increases. There are exceptions to this, but nine times out of ten, the problem will get worse.

☐ Look for a strong straight top line that never droops even when the animal relaxes. Show cattle should be long-bodied, clean-front, up-headed and possesses a lot of balance and style. Look for correct muscling. Beef cattle should be thicker through the lower part of the round when viewed from the rear. The muscle should be long – not rounded.

☐ I like to see cattle standing on a heavy bone that is medium in length as well. You can determine if an animal is going to be a large, medium or small framed animal by looking at the length of the cannon bone. The beef cattle industry today is calling for the middle of road framed cattle that are really thick when viewed from the rear.

☐ Some other factors that are important in selection are breed, color, disposition and finally hair. In selecting steers, color and hair are very important to me. Judges are definitely prejudice to color and hair. One can cover-up a lot of undesirable characteristics of an animal if the animal has good hair that has been worked with and trained. When feeding for the major shows, selecting a breed should be considered according to the likes and dislikes of the feeder. A good disposition is very important in selecting show cattle.

☐ The age of a show calf is extremely important when selecting steers and heifers. You need to know the classes for the shows you plan to go to before you select your show calf. Ideally, you do not want to choose a heifer that will be the youngest in its class. Be sure to choose a steer that will be old enough to grow to at least the minimum weight limit. Steers should really be 14-19 months old by show day.

☐ After you have selected your animal, be sure that you find out if the animal has been vaccinated against black leg and malignant edema and any infectious disease that might be prominent in your area.

☐ Find out what kind of feed the animal has been eating and try to start them on a similar feeding program. External and internal parasites need to be controlled in order for your show calf to grow properly.
