Administration News from Glen:

I have spent the last couple of days with the Western Extension Directors in our semi-annual meeting. Our discussion has reminded me that a sub-group of the western states have banded together to work on building urban/metropolitan Extension for the last several years. Washington State Extension is hosting the Western Center for Metropolitan Extension and Research in Everett, Washington.

The Center, formed a couple of years ago, is somewhat virtual in that Brad Gaolach (the part-time center director) is located there, but the center is really made up of Extension activities and leaders from metropolitan areas across the west. This past year they have organized a series of webinars on urban/metro Extension innovation. There is a sense that the urban west is different than the rest of the country, thus the need for a western approach to urban Extension, and a western center. By my description, most western states are composed of a large metro area or two and the rest of the state is a lot like Wyoming, rural with small and medium sized towns. I have been watching the activities of this center to see how their work and approaches to Extension might help us reach new audiences in Wyoming. My interest may seem a little counterintuitive, but I expect that Extension's efforts to serve metropolitan clients in the west will result in innovative and creative approaches to Extension. Approaches that may be applicable or at least adaptable to our small towns and cities in Wyoming.

As you may know, there is also an eastern/southern focused collaboration on urban Extension that has ebbed and flowed for at least a couple of decades. I have been less attentive to their work, but expect it is potentially as interesting and useful. You might be asking yourself, why is he writing about this? Only for this reason...for students of Extension practice and innovation, the struggles of more metropolitan and urban states to address their urban audiences may be an epicenter for Extension creativity and innovation over the next decade or so. I wouldn't want to miss it or even be late to the party.

Civil Rights Tip

ADA Checklist for Existing Facilities - The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requires state and local governments, businesses, and non-profit organizations to provide goods, services, and programs to people with disabilities on an equal basis with the rest of the public. Some people think that only new construction and alterations need to be accessible and that older facilities are "grandfathered," but that's not true. Because the ADA is a civil rights law and not a building code, older facilities are often required to be accessible to ensure that people with disabilities have an equal opportunity to participate.

The ADA has different requirements for state and local governments and for places of public accommodation (businesses and non-profit organizations that provide goods to or serve the public).

State and local governments (ADA title II entities) must ensure "program accessibility." Public accommodations (ADA title III entities) must remove structural and communication barriers where it is "readily achievable" to do so.

The Job Accommodation Network (JAN) is a web site that provides a variety of resources including an ADA Library, Publications and Resources, A-Z Disabilities and Accommodations. Information in the Civil Rights Tip has been modified from information featured in JAN (www.askjan.org). Next month's Civil Rights Tip will focus on program accessibility and readily achievable barrier removal.
