

To the Johnson County 4-H Community,

February's weather turned out to be a far cry from the cold snowy winter we experienced in December and January. With the exceptionally warm weather, the bald eagles roosting in the cottonwood trees to the east of the UWE office witnessed a steady stream of traffic coming to talk 4-H. Although a short month, there were several committee meetings with many lively discussions taking place on how to better the 4-H program and do what is best for our kids. As always, I came away extremely optimistic for both the short- and long-term plans for 4-H in Johnson County.

The single most important factor for my optimism is the overall quality of the Johnson County youth and adult volunteers. Watching both the young and old 4-H folks of Johnson County engaged in community, school, and 4- H activities, I see hard-working kind people. The overall quality of our youth, really hit home after I read about the Random Acts of Kindness Week Initiative. A group called Kindness Wyoming promoted a week filled with kind acts with results that were felt by people throughout the state. Kindness Wyoming recognizes that every organization has unique resources, employees, students, and leaders, and they encouraged all to explore creative ideas and opportunities for celebrating Random Acts of Kindness Week. Even without this initiative, being kind is evident in Johnson County. Johnson County 4-H folks are always encouraging a culture of kindness and this culture is readily seen in the youth enrolled in 4-H. Character does count!

One K2 news report stated: The group "Kindness Wyoming" launched the state initiative with a signed proclamation from Governor Matt Mead. ... scientific studies show that being kind can have tangible health effects, such as lowering blood pressure, reducing stress and anxiety, and helping with better sleep. The acts of kindness can also help with what Chris Murray of Kindness Wyoming calls 'the body and soul effects. It just makes you feel good and when you feel good that makes you want to do more kind things.' Feeling good and doing more kind things seems to be the norm for those in Johnson County 4-H, not for this one week but throughout the year.

Donna Nelson submitted an invoice for \$257.35 for paper for 4-H Carnival raffle ticket printing. Adri Ruby made a motion to reimburse Donna Nelson for \$257.35 for the paper for raffle ticket printing, Kieran Murray seconded, motion carried.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Programs: There was discussion regarding who should serve on the Programs Committee, and what the needs of our 4-H program here in Johnson County. There was a review of the bylaws regarding the duties of the Programs Committee. One parent at the meeting suggested that we advertise in the Clover Chatter input from the 4-H community what our project area leader needs are. Jim Dawson suggested that the Programs Committee meet before the next 4-H Council meeting on Monday, March 13, 2017. The Fair Frenzy was discussed at this time as well, and expectations/needs in Johnson County at Fair Frenzy. A suggestion was made that both the Programs Committee and Project Area Leaders are invited and attend the Programs Committee Meeting to discuss and help determine our current needs.

Publicity: Jim Dawson has been able to work with Principal Craig Andersen and community project leaders/4-H club members to plan a 4-H Expo at Cloud Peak Elementary School on Tuesday, February 28, from 1-3 pm. Elizabeth Downare suggested that we try to arrange for 4-H club members to set up a table after school at CPES following the Expo Day to: sign up kids interested in 4-H, make available 4-H club names with openings for new members, and collect contact/follow-up information for those kids.

Fundraisers: 4-H community clubs will be receiving a work schedule sign up for blocks of time to volunteer one youth and one adult member to work at a Fun-on-the-Go station, the ticket table, and at the prize booth at the 4-H Carnival. Each club is being asked to bring ONE CROCK POT of soup to the 4-H Carnival. Breadboard is donating bread to serve with the soup, and Pepsi is donating pop. 4-H members are also reminded to bring 2 cakes/baked goods for the cake walk; Chuck Ragels suggested that in lieu of a white elephant gift for BINGO awards, each club could bring one \$10 gift card. Raffle tickets will be available Friday, February 17, 2017 at the 4-H UWE Extension office for 4-H members to pick up to sell. Adri Ruby suggested that a possible future fundraiser could be selling smoothies at an event, has seen great success with this recently in another community. Awards and Recognition: The Fair Board, the YES committee, and the Awards and Recognition Committee, and Project Leaders have met on January 25, 2017 and again on February 1, 2017 regarding county fair awards. A proposal has been made that the 4-H Council pick up fair award premiums, which would cost the council approximately \$6,000.00 annually. Following a lengthy discussion, Chanda Rule suggested that we table this topic, and that 4-H Council meet for an Executive Session Meeting to discuss the budget with this proposal. 

Planning is now underway for the 2017 Johnson County 4-H Mountain Camp!

Johnson County 2017 4-H Mountain Camp is scheduled for Friday, July 14th with the family BBQ ending the camp on Sunday July 16th. Last year's "Boot Camp" was great fun and the Mtn Camp planning committee is looking to build on the excitement generated by our leaders, cooks, campers, and junior leaders.



The safety of our 4-H campers is always first and foremost on the minds of the planning committee. One of the most important factors in ensuring the safety of the youth participants is to provide adequate adult supervision. Chaperones are to be provided from each of the community clubs and the only way we can offer a 2017 Mtn Camp is with a team of certified adult volunteers!

The Wyoming 4-H requirements for any 4-H activity with overnight stays are:

- All 4-H youth activities with i overnight stays must be supervised by a minimum of two designated adults.
- . When chaperoning overnight events there shall be a 1:10 ratio of adults to youth.
- · Chaperones for overnight stays must be at least 21 years of age.
- Along with being currently certified 4-H chaperones must complete additional 4-H training.

Adults that are 19 years of age may apply to be a **certified** UW 4-H Volunteer. To achieve UW certified volunteer status, adults must complete the following process:

- Enroll through 4-HOnline each year. (https://wy.4hOnline.com).
- Complete and successfully pass the UW background check every five years.
- 4-H volunteers returning to 4-H after a year or more break in service must redo the screening process.
- Participate in the 4-H Volunteer Certification Training

4-H Chaperone Training from the Wyoming State 4-H Office

Thank you for volunteering to serve as a chaperone for a Wyoming 4-H event. Follow the directions below to access the National 4-H Headquarters Overnight Chaperone Training. The training will provide you with additional resources related to chaperoning events and staying overnight with you.

38 Program Overview

The Wyoming 4-H program serves over 6,900 youth ages 8-18, with a significant number of those, 3,129 (45%), involved in livestock projects.

The Pathways to Higher Education Program draws on the rich history of the 4-H program, integrating real-life, handson animal science education with 4-H members' project experiences.

This program allows youth to enroll in a college course at the University of Wyoming to earn credit for their 4-H work and livestock projects. The multi-year, sequential course culminates with a capstone learning experience on campus at the animal science department and submission of a portfolio of their learning experiences.

& Course Outline

Each year, members explore topics in nutrition, evaluation and selection, meat science, care and prevention, and reproduction, including in-depth studies of breeds of beef cattle, small animals (rabbits and poultry), sheep, horses, goats and swine.

38 Program Details

Youth begin the program by signing up through 4-H Online for 4-H ANSCI 1009 activity. The course is designed to offer 1-4 UW credits after completion. For 4 credits, youth participate over a three-year period in a series of learning experiences throughout the state.

These learning experiences encompass online learning modules, classroom work, and hands-on experiences with at least one hands-on capstone event at the University of Wyoming.

Members submit their complete portfolio of learning activities for review and pay all fees associated with UW enrollment to receive final credit.

Eligibility

Participation is limited to students who are freshmen in high school or older with at least one year of 4-H age eligibility left.



U.S. Targhee Sheep Association Starter Flock

Three Free Registered Targhee Sheep to be Awarded to Deserving Youth

The U.S. Targhee Sheep Association (USTSA) will again be offering a free registered Targhee Starter flock to a deserving youth at the 2017 USTSA National Show & Sale in Pierre, South Dakota, July 13th-15th. The winner must be present to receive the flock and will be awarded one (1) ewe lamb, one (1) yearling ewe, and one (1) brood ewe donated by members of the USTSA. Each animal will be a USTSA registered animal, and at least QR in Scrapie Codon 171 genotype. The winner will also receive a \$150 credit for use toward purchase of additional animals at the 2017 sale.

Applications, due **April 1st**, are now available to download at www.ustargheesheep.org or by contacting Mardy Rutledge at the USTSA office (ustargheesheep@gmail.com or 702-292-5715). Any young person, ages 9-17, as of January 1, 2017, may apply. Applicants should possess a keen interest in the U.S. sheep industry, commitment to raising Targhee sheep over time, and a firm belief in the abilities of the breed. Applicants must demonstrate proof of care, facilities, and transportation. Aside from receiving the flock of sheep, the winning youth, will be paired with a Targhee breeder living near them who will act as a mentor. The association is committed to helping the winner succeed.

Targhee sheep are one of the few breeds developed in the United States at the U.S. Sheep Experiment Station in Dubois, Idaho. Withstanding harsh environments and minimal human intervention, while still producing high quality lamb and wool are hallmark traits of Targhees. Mothering ability and gentle dispositions are additional positive traits of the breed.

The U.S. Targhee Sheep Association believes in the future. The success the program has had thus far has only affirmed it is the right thing to do for young people. Purely Poultry







Chicks, ducklings and other live poultry can carry harmful germs even if poultry appear healthy! It is important to wash your hands thoroughly with soap and water after touching live poultry.

Washing your hands and other materials associated

with raising or caring for live poultry for at least 20 seconds will help decrease the spread of diseases! Keep your poultry and family safe by practicing good hygiene. If soap is unavailable it is always safer to use hand sanitizer than NOTHING.

CHICK CARE- Once you receive your chicks, it is important to place them on clean, safe bedding. Pine or cedar bedding is best to use. It absorbs moisture and feces helping to keep harmful germs away. Chicks also need to stay warm! They will need adequate high temperatures (85°F-115°F). Ensure that the heat source is placed high enough to let the chicks move and find different temperature zones!

Avian Influenza (AI)

Avian Influenza has 2
different forms or strains, Low
Pathogenicity Avian
Influenza (LAPI) and High
Pathogen Influenza (HPAI).
Both strains of AI are
dangerous to various poultry
species, including chickens,
turkeys, geese and domestic
ducks. Common symptoms
of LPAI include coughing,
sneezing, depression and
ruffled feathers. A decrease

in egg production is also a common symptom of LPAI. LPAI strains occur naturally in wild migratory waterfowl and illness. HPAI is EXTREMELY infectious and often fatal to poultry. Its spreads very quickly and some common symptoms are lack of energy, decreased appetite, coughing, sneezing, diarrhea, purple discoloration of wattles and




