

To the Johnson County 4-H Community,

September came and went in what seemed like a blink of an eye. As we look at the start of October and plan for the coming 4-H year, we also need to reflect on a very successful 2016-2017 4-H year. Johnson County 4-H is dynamic and several changes including new 4-H policies are based on best practices in 4-H youth development. The purpose of the 4-H program and community clubs is to foster the youth development principles of Belonging, Independence, Generosity, and Mastery. Positive Youth Development (PYD) comes via involvement in community clubs, service work, and learning in the various project areas and the 4-H youth of Johnson County grew in many ways.

Although some project area names have changed, 4-H continues to offer a wide variety of project areas for our youth to delve into. With this array of projects, we are always needing caring adults to serve as project area leaders. This winter I plan to conduct several adult leader training opportunities to build a larger pool of project areas leaders. Many project area exhibits were showcased at the county and state fairs with many youth and a trailer load of purple & blue ribbon exhibits making it to the WSF. The youth of JC did really well in areas from bugs to wool!

As we start the 2017-2018 4-H year, many clubs are about to have their first meeting of the year or are about to schedule a meeting. These early community club meetings establish parameters for memberships (club by-laws) and set annual goals. Club leadership is determined by the election of youth officers and it is important to train youth for these leadership roles, particularly for the management of the financial resources of the club. Remember bank signature card changes!

Renewal of clubs via chartering, along with leader and youth re-enrollments should be on everyone's mind. October 1 starts the renewal processes and we need to realize there are newly established state 4-H policies including new requirements pertaining to financial accountability.

Thanks to many in JC, 4-H is growing and providing Positive Youth Development opportunities.

SECRETARY REPORT

Minutes of the July meeting were not read aloud as they were published in the September 2017 Clover Chatter. An addendum was made to the July meeting minutes to include the board's approval to pay Bev Boden \$63.13 for produce team judging supplies. Kristen Hepp made a motion to approve the meeting minutes with the addendum, Elise Rose seconded, motion carried.

TREASURER REPORT

Treasurer Kristen Hepp reported the following balances for the 4-H Council: Checking - \$36,076.91, Wyoming 4-H Foundation - \$26,133.56, and Endowment - \$11,361.25. The Treasurer's Report provided (see attached sheet) included expenses totaling \$10,443.90 and income totaling \$3,138.39. Kristen reported income from lemonade stand at County Fair - \$2,579.39. She stated that the 4-H Council is in the process of County Fair premium checks being signed and will be disbursed to clubs soon. Kristen received invoices from Kaycee and Buffalo Chambers of Commerce to continue annual chamber membership. Cristie Murray made a motion to continue annual chamber memberships and pay fees, Kami Kennedy seconded, motion carried. Elise Rose moved to approve the Treasurer's report, Karma Thomas seconded, motion carried.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Jim Dawson provided this year's list of project area leaders and committee volunteers for review (see attached copies), and he requested signups for any new volunteers to serve as project area leaders, club leaders, and council committee leaders for the 2017-2018 4-H year. Year-end summaries and 2018 needs were requested for tonight's meeting in preparation for the 4-H Council's executive budget planning meeting.

Programs:

Horse – Amanda Kaufmann reported that this year's horse project had a great program and horse show. She reported plans to implement more horse-related programs to the horse project next year. Regarding budgetary needs for the project, she requested ongoing funding for kids to attend Horse Camp and Wyoming State Fair. She requested 50% reimbursement for horse project kids who attended state fair. Kristen Hepp requested reimbursement forms for all horse project state fair attendees, as she has two reimbursement forms at this time.

Shooting Sports – Don Conklin provided the council with a 2017 Expenses and Income report (see attached copy). He requested continued funding from the 4-H Council to support the club activities, and funding for awards for County Shoot. Regarding the Endowment that was started to sustain the Shooting Sports program, further information will be provided when it becomes available. Don and Sophia Conklin plan to meet with the shooting sports leaders soon to evaluate this year's program and discuss next year's program.

Fabric and Fashion – Elizabeth Downare reported that two new sewing machines and a new surger were purchased for the project this year, and kids came into the 4-H office to use the machines to finish their projects, and the machines were used for workshops as well. For next year, she would like to have someone come and work with the kids on how to present during the Style Review and how to add embellishments to their projects. Adri Ruby reported that the kids had great representation and success at Wyoming State Fair this year. Chanda requested budgetary needs for next year.

fund the project with the goal of providing kids job internships but also career planning/reaching. She will come up with a budget for the New Year. She expressed her passion for this program and her desire to keep it a part of JC 4-H

Junior Leaders – Although not present, Elizabeth Downare reported that Ashlee Bassett and Alecia Downare both helped the junior leaders and provided fun activities during County Fair. Jim Dawson reported the junior leaders were vital at Mountain Camp. Attendance is expected to grow next year for junior leaders.

Clover Buds and Produce Evaluation Team – Although not present, Jim Dawson reported for Bev Boden that she would like to request a budget for next year for the produce evaluation team.

Publicity: Ideas were considered for various advertising – The Buffalo Bulletin, The Mini, and the Country Bounty. Kristen Hepp made a motion to have the 4-H Council look into having the Country Bounty publish the Johnson County Fair results, and that we meet with the other committees (Livestock Committee and Fair Board) for future media advertising of County Fair/results. Kami Kennedy seconded, motion carried. National 4-H Week is October 2-7, 2017, and plan to have 4-H kids talk on the radio again to promote JC 4-H/enrollment. There was also talk of holding another 4-H Project Expo at CPES, preferably in the fall. Principal Craig Anderson will bring up at the school's next Staff Development Day in October.

Fundraisers: Donations coming in has totaled about \$9,000 so far, about the same as 2016.

Awards and Recognition: Premium Checks will be disbursed to clubs soon, and the committee will establish a budget for the New Year. Achievement night date of October 21st was suggested. Kristen Hepp moved to set October 21, 2017 as Achievement Night, Kami Kennedy seconded, motion carried.

Livestock Committee: The committee met last on August 5th, and Jim Dawson provided a 2017 Livestock Sale Numbers doc (see attached). Their next meeting will be on September 19, 2017.

Special Committees:

Record Book Judging – Two dates, this Thursday, September 14, 2017 and next Monday, September 18, 2018, were proposed to begin record book judging. The committee *will* start record book judging this Thursday.

Wyoming 4-H Member Achievement Program - The achievement program is designed to recognize youth members' continued involvement in the Wyoming 4-H Program. Youth between the ages of 8 and 18 can receive annual recognition based on their efforts. The annual recognition categories are listed below:

Membership Recognition

- Member has turned in all required enrollment materials
- Member has behaved in an appropriate manner at all 4-H activities, events, meetings
- Member is enrolled in at least one project
- Member is enrolled in at least one club or has approval of County 4-H Educator

Silver Recognition

- Member meets Membership Recognition criteria outlined above
- Member has exhibited what he/she has learned at some point in the current 4-H year
- Member provides documentation of setting goals, knowledge/skills gained, and participation in project via the <u>portfolio</u>.

Gold Recognition

- Member meets Membership Recognition criteria outlined above
- Member has exhibited what he/she learned at some point in the current 4-H year
- Member provides documentation of participation in all essential elements of positive youth development: setting goals, knowledge/skills gained, recognition, leadership, community service, and participation via the portfolio.

Honors Club

The ultimate achievement a 4-H member can obtain is induction into the Wyoming 4-H Honors Club achieved by receiving nineteen (19) points over the course of the member's involvement. A member receives three (3) points for years in which Gold Recognition is achieved and one (1) point for each year Silver Recognition is achieved.

Wyseming 4-H *UW EXTENSION

How do I get started in Johnson County (JC) 4-H?

We in the JC University of Wyoming Extension (UWE) Office are always excited to help those interested in joining 4-H. 4-H is open to all youth of JC ages 8-18, as of January 1st of the current 4-H year, with the 4-H year October 1 - September 30. Members may enroll at any time of the year, although some projects have deadlines.

The UWE office is located at 30 Fairgrounds Road in Buffalo with office hours from 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. and is closed over the noon hour. (summer7:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.). The 4-H office phone number is 684-7522, so call or stop by for help with 4-H related questions.

The steps to become a new 4-H youth member in Johnson County are:

Step 1: All 4-H enrollment starts online via https://wyoming.4honline.com, by creating a family profile and selecting project areas from over 40 areas. Upon enrollment a member will receive notification from the state 4-H office, a monthly newsletter, and JC email updates.

Step 2: During 4Honline enrollment, members will be asked to choose a club or select club placement requested. Please do not hesitate to call the UWE office or contact a club leader to see if a club is full or would be a good fit. There are currently 12 JC community clubs and all youth in JC 4-H must be a member of one of these clubs. Each Club's structure varies but all must adhere to Wyoming 4-H Policy. (Youth may be a club member of 4-H in only one state and one county at any time).

Step 3: Upon enrollment and club placement the community club leaders will receive notification of any new member in the club. They invite new members to upcoming club meetings and events. As a new 4-H club member you can participate in fun activities, community service, and learn by doing projects under the guidance of caring 4-H leaders.



2017-2018 4-H CLUB CHARTERING

All Johnson County 4-H clubs must renew their club charters at the start of the new 4-H year shortly after October 1st. Chartering is the process by which a group is recognized as an official 4-H club by the UWE. Upon meeting established requirements, a charter is presented to the new 4-H club. Failure to meet club chartering requirements and/or leader certification may result in the loss of the charter or restrictions placed upon a club. As of the January 11th 2016, 4-H Council meeting, the motion carried whereby clubs failing to complete chartering prior to December 15th be fined \$100.

4-H Clubs must be officially chartered through the University of Wyoming Extension (UWE) with the 4-H educator responsible for guiding the community club leaders and directing the process.

The established requirements for a 4-H club charter:

- A membership of at least five 4-H members from at least two separate families.
- 4-H club leaders must maintain their UWE 4-H certification active status with a screened volunteer leader to supervise the organizational needs and programs of the club, two are recommended.
- An appropriately structured club utilizing a leadership team of elected youth officers.
- The club and volunteers from the club must be prepared to support the 4-H program above the local club level, i.e. participation in county 4-H council meetings or county development committees.
- A calendar of planned educational activities (i.e. meetings, workshops, community service, etc.).
- Create 4-H club bylaws using the state 4-H template (newly adopted by the state 4-H office in 2017).
- Adherence to JC 4-H Council bylaws.
- Approval of application by the county UWE 4-H educator.
- If the club anticipates raising funds, generating income, or having bank accounts, an Employer Identification. Number /Tax Identification Number (EIN/TIN) is a requirement of the IRS.

Each year 4-H clubs shall be evaluated and approved for renewal to continue operating as an official JC community club for the upcoming 4-H year. The following information should be collected for evaluation and renewal:

- The Wyoming 4-H Club Treasurer's Handbook (new in 2017)


