

Dear Johnson County 4-H Community:

On February 2nd over 35 youth and adult volunteers teamed up to conduct a 4-H Project Expo at Cloud Peak Elementary School (CPES). This was a win-win day for CPES school staff and students, as well as the Johnson County 4-H community. 15 project areas were presented by our 4-H members including sessions on small and large critters, judging, fashion and fabric, foods, entomology, and crafts. With upwards of 300 students in grades 3-5th this audience was the perfect demographic to get introduced to JC 4-H. Many students went home thinking about all the fun they could have if they joined 4-H. Our passionate and dedicated volunteers shared their knowledge, skills, and enthusiasm for these project areas sparking an interest in both those that knew a lot or those that just knew a little of what 4-H in JC has to offer. Fun, engaging activities lead by caring adults with support from a generous community is what we got in JC 4-H!

Volunteering is how things get done in 4-H and a big thanks goes out to each and every volunteer that helped make the Project Expo at CPES a success. Special thanks to CPES Principal Craig Anderson and the 4-H Council Executive Board for seeing the value of doing this Expo on an annual basis.

Along with thanking our volunteers for their service, the UWE state and Johnson County offices continues to offer trainings to help ensure that when volunteers work with youth the activities are engaging, fun, and follow the Wyoming 4-H program policies. The updated UWE 4-H policies and certification requirements are designed to better serve all the youth in Wyoming 4-H. SECRETARY REPORT

Secretary Cristie Murray did not read the minutes of the January meeting as they were published in the February Clover Chatter. Colson Myers made a motion to approve the January meeting minutes as published in the Clover Chatter, Cooper Myers seconded, motion carried.

TREASURER REPORT

Kami Kennedy reported the following balances for the 4-H Council: Checking - \$25,352.98, Wyoming 4-H Foundation - \$26,285.84, and Endowment - \$11,427.45. The Treasurer's Report provided (see attached sheet) included current balances for Other Accounts: Livestock Judging - \$2,844.91; Shooting Sports - \$2,449.12; and 4-H @ Work - \$2,569.25. Two separate donations were reported - \$50.00 Tripey Donation, and a \$61.80 Donation. James Dawson made a correction to the Treasurer's Report that the \$61.80 Donation is to go to the Junior Leaders Account. Elise Rose made a motion to approve the treasurer's report with Jim Dawson's amendment, Sarah Myers seconded, motion carried.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Programs: President Amanda Monterastelli encouraged more project leaders to fill project areas where there is no current leader, or to even help current leaders. Cake Decorating now has 17 enrolled members!

Publicity: Chamber of Commerce E-blasts going out every week. Don and Sophia Conklin presented information at the meeting for an 11" X 7" two-page, double-sided insert in the Country Bounty that would be disbursed to all Johnson County residents. The paper and printing would be done at the 4-H Extension office and the total cost for this would be \$535.54 for 3,398 inserts to be distributed. The emphasis is on getting information regarding Johnson County Fair Results out in a timely and accurate manner following fair. This will be considered. Jim Dawson included a discussion regarding the Buffalo Bulletin's past partnership with 4-H and their support, we need to consider all sides of getting the Fair Results out accurately and in a timely fashion, while ensuring our long history with the paper is not ignored. Costs of doing business out of County may have long term implications. Jim also expressed the need to discuss the copies being made in house in the UWE Office with Dr. Horn to ensure we are not going beyond what machine & copier contract are designed to do.

The Johnson County 4-H program offers several shooting sports disciplines for youth to explore, practice, and compete at the local, state and national level. Disciplines include: rifle, pistol, air pistol, air rifle, muzzle loading, shot gunning, and archery.

• Indoor Air Rifle and Air Pistol practices (February)

We are planning a 4 week concentration in Air Rifle and Air Pistol instruction in the Fairgrounds Community Building. Practices will begin Tuesday, February 13th at 6:00 p.m. Air Rifle and Air Pistol will hold a competitive event at the end of 4 wks. of practice.

- Safety Orientation Meetings (March): All 4-H Shooting Sports enrollees must attend one of two safety meetings and complete a safety test prior to shooting. Options are Thursday, March 15th or Thursday March 22nd both start 5:30 p.m. at the Buffalo Trap and Skeet Club (BTSC), off Stockyard Road.

JC youth interested in exploring, practicing, and competing in 4-H shooting sports are dependent upon trained and certified 4-H Shooting Sports leaders. 4-H Shooting Sports leader certification involves: registration via Wyoming 4-H Online, 4-H volunteer training and screening plus shooting sports discipline specific training.

*4-H State Wool Judging Contest rules:

- Contestants must be 4-H members in good standing in the county they are representing.
- There is no limit to the number of youth that can be entered in a contest.
- All ages are as of January 1 of the year in which the contest takes place.
- There are three age categories in which an individual may be eligible to compete:
 Junior (8-10 years old) Intermediate (11-13 years old) Senior (14-18 years old)
- Contestants competing as individuals are eligible for all awards in their respective age category.
- Each county may send senior teams (ages 14-18) and junior teams (ages 8-13). A team
 consists of 3 or 4 designated members; the sum of the three high scores will determine
 the team score. Only contestants entered as a member of a county team are eligible for team
 awards.



What: 4-H Market Beef Feeding Workshop



JOHNSON COUNTY 4-H Leader Certification

The second in a series of 4-H leader orientations will be conducted on Tuesday March 20th allowing volunteer leaders to finish the final step in their 4-H leader certification process!

To achieve UW certified volunteer status, adults must complete the following process:

i. Submit an enrollment application through 4-HOnline.

(https://wy.4hOnline.com). In this process, volunteers agree to the Wyoming 4-H Volunteer Code of Conduct, Training and Screening Understanding, Statement of Assumed Risk, Publicity Release, and Transportation Release.

ii.Complete and successfully pass the UW background check every five years. *4-H volunteers returning to 4-H after a year or more break in service must successfully pass the screening process.

iii. Participate in the 4-H Volunteer Certification Online Training.

After all three of the state 4-H office pieces have been completed the State 4-H Office invites you to learn about your county program.

*The final step in the New 4-H Leader certification process will be to meet with JC 4-H Educator, Jim Dawson, for a training. Once this is completed you will be accepted on 4-H online and you will be an approved volunteer.

JC 4-H Council voted for all 4-H Community Clubs to have their By-laws updated with newly established UWE 4-H State office template by May 1st!!

Why does a 4-H club need by-laws? By having fair and written rules all members have an understanding of the club structure. The following is a suggested format for 4-H club by-laws. Some sections may be adapted to meet local needs. Include in the by- laws the date it was approved as well as the date it was most recently revised. The by-laws describe when and where the club meets, what officers the club elects, etc. The 4-H Club By-Laws need to be readily available to every family and easy to find. The 4-H Club By-Laws should be kept current; reviewing them annually by the 4-H Club membership.

What Are the Benefits of the Members and Leaders creating and reviewing their By-Laws? Everyone in the club should get the opportunity to participate in the creation of these documents. Member involvement in creating these documents is an excellent way to develop interest, leadership, writing skills, and decision-making skills. The entire 4-H club is responsible for writing and approving the bylaws. It is important that members, parents and volunteer leaders have input in how the club operates. Adults should only serve as advisors to the team of youth who create and revise the document.

Tips for the By-Law Process: The mention of creating or updating the club's by-laws is not that exciting, therefore the process must be hands on, fun, and exciting. The educational component will come naturally as the process unfolds. One of the first things a club may want to do is establish a committee to design and create a draft for the club to review. This does not all have to be done in the same night, give yourself and the team some time to process their thoughts and add to valuable discussion.

Process ideas: Below are a few ideas that may be helpful in providing ownership to the process.

- Post flip chart paper up around the room, each paper having a separate article on the top of the page.
 - Have members of the team walk around the room and write up what they think belongs under each heading.
 - O Have members write information and ideas on a note card and then post the note card under the appropriate heading.
- Divide the team into smaller groups giving each group a listing of sections. Allow the groups to brainstorm information that should be included under each article.

Whatever method your team chooses to use, the processing of ideas is vital for team success. Once ideas are gathered and presented, discussion must take place. The group can move the ideas around and create a logical flow for their club. Again, this is a process over time, it is not designed to all happen in one meeting.

What to do once your by-laws have been created: After the document is put together in draft form, it must be presented to the club for adoption or ratification. The first step in this process is to read aloud and discuss each article individually. Final ratification or adoption will not occur until the next meeting. This allows members time to think about the material and suggest any changes before voting. The final step to this process is to read the document in its entirety at the next meeting and to take a final vote of the 4-H Club membership on rather to except the document as read.

JOHNSON COUNTY FAIR BOARD POLICY

The Johnson County (JC) Fair Board and Livestock Committee continually strives to provide the safest environment possible for all 4-H and FFA livestock brought onto the Fairgrounds. To ensure the best facility for our youth exhibitors to house their livestock and achieve this goal the JC Fair Board and Livestock Committee has established the following changes to our health policy. This motion and vote passed at the February 6th 2018 Livestock Committee meeting with implementation at the 2018 JC Fair.

Biosecurity is the implementation of measures to prevent the introduction of disease into a healthy population of animals or limit the spread of disease once introduced.

Our animal biosecurity is primarily designed on minimizing the risk of serious disease, with that being said the Fair Board cannot guarantee there will be no animal health issues. There is always a risk when bringing livestock to town but the Fair Board and Livestock Committee hopes these steps will help minimize the risks.

The most important steps to ensure healthy animals start at home, so please if you feel you have a sick animal do not bring it to the Fairgrounds and work with your superintendent and a veterinarian to ensure your animal is healthy.

During weigh-ins there will be a veterinarian onsite to inspect any animal a superintendent suspects may have a health issue. The Fair Board will also require all 4-H or FFA breeding animals, along with open class animals, to check in at the appropriate species weigh-in station to be inspected. There will be a walk through by a veterinarian on Monday (July 30th) evening also as an additional safety check. The Fair Board will also have a veterinarian on call throughout Fair week if any animal health issues arise.


