To the Johnson County (JC) 4-H Community,

November, like the months before, came and went in the blink of an eye but in retrospect we can all be delighted with the growth the JC 4-H program is experiencing. One of the most significant recent action items has been the work of the 4-H Council on the 2018-2019 budget. Their efforts resulted in a working budget that encourages increased project area learning and greater involvement with state 4-H activities. Part of the Council's vision for the program is to set aside more money for future educational opportunities. Again, thanks to our Council's visionaries.

With the new budget approved, there is an immediate need to revise Council By-Laws. The previous By-Laws/Constitution appendices were emailed out to all Community Club leaders and proposed revisions will be discussed during the December 10th Council meeting (combined with a Christmas celebration which will be conducted at 6:45 p.m. in the Fairgrounds Community Building). The Council's executive board will present the revised By-Laws appendices addressing the budgetary increases needed to better meet local, state, and national scholarships or sponsorships.

With most community clubs having completed the required chartering process including setting annual goals and planning activities, the familiar questions seem to arise. These questions include: How do we make things better in 2019 for the members of the club? How do we recruit new members and leaders (the state office has a goal of at least one newly certified adult leader in each community club)? How do we increase engagement of members (especially the older ones) and leaders? A simple answer is to create a positive club experience, where kids and adults feel they are an important and valued member of a vibrant club. This is how we get them coming back!

As we plan club improvements, fundraisers, and work to meet club goals and engage in educational activities please do not forget to invite 4-H alumni, a 4-H Council member, Fair Board members or County Commissioners to attend your club activities. Johnson County folks are truly interested in youth development and seeing the 4-H program grow. Even if folks the folks you invite cannot attend they will certainly be delighted by your invitation. You might be surprised who shows up!

Due to the UWE winter break and the closing of the Johnson County office from Dec 23rd- Jan 2nd, the next issue of the Clover Chatter will come out in February, with any January notifications sent out via mailings, 4HOnline and the JC Facebook page. The date for the first 4-H Council Meeting in 2019 is January 14th.

We in the UWE office wish all a happy holiday season and anticipate great things for JC 4-H in 2019! We are thankful for the commitment of a proactive 4-H council, dedicated JC adult leaders, county commissioners, community supporters, and the great youth enrolled in Johnson County 4-H!

Treasurer's Report

Treasurer's Report
Kami Kennedy reported the following balances for the 4-H Council: Checking - \$26,079.33, Wyoming 4-H
Foundation - \$29,334.70, Endowment - \$10,000.00 and Scholarship - \$21,729.32. The Treasurer's Report
included balances for Livestock Judging - \$2,507.52, Shooting Sports - \$6,323.38 and 4-H at Work - \$2,641.25.
Monthly expenses totaled \$2,803.19 and monthly income was \$1,760.00. Donna Nelson stated that a deposit of
\$850.00 from Range Telephone should have been included in the income. Kami found the deposit and said that
she would make the appropriate corrections. Regarding the Fair Premium Cash: there was \$400.00 that was not
collected and that money was used to purchase a newer trailer for use of the Lemonade Stand. Keri Malson
moved to approve the Treasurer's Report and Teresa Bessler seconded, motion was carried.

Committee Reports

Amanda asked that all club members take a Committee Form back to their club meetings have adults sign up for various committees. The need to recruit new committee members' form EVERY club is very important.

Programs: Kami Kennedy presented the budget for the upcoming year.

Income - It was discussed that the 4-H Carnival and donations are the major incomes.

This past year the Carnival increased some, but donations were down some.

Expenses - The cost of projects was broke down better. We discussed the cost of camps and the reimbursement to the members. An appendix was handed out for clubs to look over. The Council is currently discussing increasing the reimbursement that club members get after they go to a 4-H camp. Stipulations of Fundraising and Record Books will have to be accomplished before reimbursement is granted. If any member cannot complete the requirements, needs extra funds or has a special request – we urge them to please come talk to the 4-H Council so that we can discuss their situation. Dona Nelson then asked about the Less Reserves of \$10,000.00. Kami explained that our cash carryover was \$27,919.75, our proposed income was 23,500.00 and our Less Reserves was \$10,000.00 (meaning we should not go below that amount in the checking account, safety net). So, our cash carryover and proposed income totaled \$41,419.75, which did not include the less reserves. Don Conklin then asked to discuss the Shooting Sports proposed income. It was discussed that the \$700 is still allotted for awards, but was felt that with the increase of other projects and the fact that Shooting Sports receives interest from an endowment and grant money, that only \$1400.00 was allotted from the 4-H Council for operating expenses. Mr. Conklin was concerned that the Council was going to solely rely on the incoming endowment and grants in the future, but he was reassured that was not the case and that if more money was needed for operating expenses that the council would be more than supportive in this project.

Fundraising: The annual 4-H Carnival will be March 15th, 2019 at Buffalo High School.

Awards and Recognition: Achievement night went very well. It had great attendance (over 100!). Don Hall was much honored. Thank you Don! We all thanked Adri Ruby and Elizabeth Downare for their dedication and hard work on the Awards Committee.

Livestock Committee: They had a meeting on November 6th and some topics that were discussed were new additions to the fairgrounds, the Salmonella outbreak during the Fair and beef weigh ins. Their next meeting is planned February 5th, 2019 at 6:30 pm.

Junior Leaders: Elizabeth Downare clarified that in order to be in Junior Leaders, you need to be at least in 7th oracle.

Mountain Camp: June 28-30, 2019. Hoping for a big turn-out!!

Special Committees: Please have adults in all clubs review the Committee Form and sign up for one. Many hands make light work!!

Old Business

The Club Leader Round Table was held October 29th with 3 out of 12 clubs in attendance. It was addressed that a one-hour Council meeting was desired. Reminder that re-enrollments for 2018-2019 for youth and adults via 4H Online need to be submitted. Club chartering is in progress. Please call the Extension Office and set up a time with Jim. **You don't want to be fined!!

New Business / Announcements

Training needs – scheduling for new leaders and new member orientation. The state office annual goal is to have new certified leaders in every 4-H Club in 2018-2019.

Review the by-law appendix regarding the Council's sponsorships and scholarships. Give all feedback to Jim Dawson before the next Council meeting.

The next Council meeting is December 10th at 6:45 pm (delayed start due to the blood draw). We will be having a Christmas party/potluck during the meeting, so please a dish to share.



Annual 4-H Renewal - The new Wyoming 4-H year started October 1st and every 4-H member, youth and adults alike, must remember to enroll or re-enroll by way of https://wyoming.4honline.com. Community Club leaders also renew their clubs via the chartering process with the 4-H Educator. Please make sure to enrollments are completed prior to the start of your next club meeting.

Youth Members - Youth enrollment in 4-H must be completed every year. While Wyoming 4-H has an open enrollment policy whereby youth may enroll at any time after October 1st, some JC clubs have membership acceptance deadlines set in their club by-laws. New families must enroll starting with the creation of a family profile which is to be used every year for all family 4-H members. New members must be admitted to one of the twelve community clubs and several of our clubs have reached their maximum enrollment as determined by established club by-laws. Youth may be a club member of 4-H in only one state and one county at any time.

4-H Community Clubs - All youth in Johnson County 4-H must be a member of one of the twelve community clubs. Each of the 12 Johnson County community clubs adopts and adheres to 4-H club bylaws and formally complete the annual chartering (club evaluation and renewal) early in the 4-H year.

Official 4-H volunteers - All JC 4-H programs and activities must be supervised by an official 4-H volunteer, this includes having a currently certified 4-H adult leader present at club meetings. Adult enrollment in 4-H must be done every year and shall be completed before supervising 4-H youth. The volunteer application process has been refined by Sarah Torbert, the new Volunteer Development Specialist, in the State 4-H office. Upon completion of enrollment, screening, training, and the annual motor vehicle records check, volunteers are able to conduct and supervise 4-H activities.

Shooting sports and horse related - All 4-H shooting sports and horse leaders who directly supervise an official 4-H shooting sports or horse related activity shall receive additional required UW 4-H training at five year intervals. JC will tentatively be hosting a shooting sports leader clinic this winter, dates TBA.

Johnson County 4-H Council – Johnson County 4-H Council Executive Officers conduct a monthly meeting which is held on the second Monday of each month. Each club is expected to have an adult and youth member at each Council meeting to voice opinions from their club and to vote as needed.

Financial Responsibility - Funds raised in the name of 4-H are publicly accountable and must be used only for 4-H purposes. All property purchased by a 4-H club, council or committee is the property of the Johnson County 4-H program. All bank accounts associated with the 4-H program must have at least two UW employees as signatory authorities. Each year after community club elections and/or adult leadership changes in the club bank account signatures must be updated.

Exchange Program Overview

Come explore the world with us! You can experience the rich history and culture of **Mongolia**, **Ghana**, **or Finland**. The International 4-H Exchange Programs are designed to advance cultural understanding, spark an interest in learning about other cultures, and develop a cadre of Americans with cultural understanding who can advance international dialogue and live and work effectively in a global society.

Mongolia will be a two way exchange with Americans traveling (outbound) followed by Mongolians visiting the US (inbound). Ghana and Finland will be outbound trips only in the summer of 2019 with the Finns planning on visiting the US in 2020. Each exchange trip will be approximately 2 weeks long – inbound and outbound.

Selection Criteria?

The program is open to current senior aged 4-H members (14-19) interested in traveling internationally, learning about different cultures, and living with a host family. Students will be selected on the following criteria:

- Personal leadership skills
- Social skills ~ Openness and flexibility
- Interest in learning about different cultures and global issues

- Travel dates ~ June~ July 2019.

How much does it cost?

The cost of each trip is **\$2,000 per person**. The Wyoming State 4-H Foundation will supplement costs for the host country for the exchange. The following expenses will be included in the trip cost:

- Roundtrip airfare to host country
- Meals and lodging
- In country logistics (i.e. transportation, etc.)
- Travel insurance, Accident and sickness protection

A \$500 deposit will be required upon selection, the remaining balance can be made in monthly payments

There will be some additional out-ofpocket expenses for participants which include:

- Passport & passport photos
- Immunization fees (if required)
- Transportation to and from outbound/inbound airport
- Spending money for souvenirs and other in-country purchases
- In-country site seeing excursions
- Modest host family gift

Volunteer Leadership Roles

As an approved Wyoming 4-H Volunteer you can take on a variety of roles in the 4-H program.

Project Volunteer - Coordinates and teaches members within a specific project area, such as photography, foods, or beef. 4-H volunteer project leaders are the "backbone" of 4-H.

Club Volunteer - Provides overall 4-H club leadership. Also coordinates members, parents, and the involvement of other leaders. 4-H Club Leaders can be an individual, a team, or a group of people that have specific roles that fulfill the 4-H Club Leader responsibilities.

Activity Volunteer - Directs activities, such as fund raising, recreation, community service, and promotion. Members learn through involvement in the activity.

Coach – Coordinate and teaches members who are planning to participate in a contest or event.

Committee Member – The 4-H program runs well when much of the work is done by committees of youth and adults who have interest in a particular area. As an approved volunteer you can serve as a voting member or in leadership of a committee to help plan a particular part of the 4-H program. A committee member might also be a volunteer who serves on a 4-H council in an advisory role to assist the 4-H educator in providing the 4-H experience. A County 4-H Council or Advisory group helps to fundraise, advocates for the 4-H program, can coordinate county level events, and overall supports the 4-H work in the county. The County Council does not serve in a policy making role.

Chaperone – Many of our events require our youth to stay overnight, like camps, contests, and trips. We have very strict policies for those volunteers staying overnight with you. Adults who chaperone:

- Must be 21 years of age or older.
- Need to participate in an additional chaperone specific training.
- There should be at least 2 deep leadership at overnight events.
- The Wyoming 4-H program requires at a 1:10 adult to youth ratio at all 4-H events.

4-H Council Committee Descriptions



All Committees:

- Report to the 4-H Council at each regular meeting
- Work with other committees to accomplish work when needed

Publicity Committee:

- Write stories about upcoming and past events and submit to local media outlets to increase public awareness of 4-H activities
- Keep and compile memorabilia of activities throughout the year
- Plan and implement activities for National 4-H Week, which is in early October, for all clubs to participate in
- Work with 4-H Council to establish a working budget for the committee, and then work within this budget

Fundraising Committee:

- Understand 4-H Council funding needs and budget requirements
- Plan fundraising activities to be completed by committee members, volunteers and youth to meet financial needs annually
- Work with 4-H Council to establish a working budget for the committee, and then work within this budget

Programs Committee:

- Work with 4-H Educator, project leaders, and other volunteers and youth to determine program needs in the county
- Design and implement programs that foster positive youth development, working with the 4-H Educator, project leaders, and other volunteers and youth in the county
- Work with 4-H Council to establish a working budget for the committee, and then work within this budget

Awards & Recognition Committee:

- Understand the 4-H Recognition Model, and utilize this model to determine a variety of methods to recognize youth and adults
- Determine appropriate times to recognize work of youth and adults throughout the program year, and provide awards at these times
- Work with 4-H Council to establish a working budget for the committee, and then work within this budget

- 4. Game and Fish Statutes and Regulations
- 5. Game Care and Wildlife Identification
- 6. Outdoor Safety



Appendix I - To the JC 4-H Council by-laws (for December 10, 2018 adoption)

For purposes of clarification to the level of support by the 4-H Council as pertaining to leaders, chaperones, coaches, or youth members to attend 4-H local or state contests or 4-H camps.

Leader/chaperone criteria:

Shall be current and up to date on 4-H certification and leader screening (MVC if driving 4-H youth) Chaperones duties must include more than just immediate family members

4-H Council will reimburse or pay for those chaperoning or coaching Johnson County 4-H members at:

JC Mountain camp - no cost for leader or chaperones

Wyoming State Fair - Council pays dorm fee, gate fees, and meal ticket

4-H State Shoot – council pays dorm or campground fee @ WSF grounds

Showcase Showdown -council pays registration, meals, and onsite lodging

4-H Horse Camp -council pays registration, meals, and onsite lodging

Any other state 4-H contests/4-H camp - council pays registration, meals, and onsite lodging

Leadership training - council pays registration, meals, and lodging up to \$250

When driving 4-H youth participants to state 4-H events in a personal vehicle mileage will be reimbursed at .50 per mile.

Youth State Trips: Wyoming State Fair, Wyoming 4-H State contests or 4-H camps

Fair Board shall pay for youth placing as top:

Senior showmanship winners or next highest division winner attending the WSF

Senior judging teams or next highest division judging teams attending a 4-H state contest

Youth winners regardless of age category with JC Grand Champion animals to attend the WSF

Senior Division style revue winners attending the WSF

Senior High Point Performance horse winner attending the WSF

4-H Council shall pay non-Fair Board awarded youth fees:

(Limit of two sponsorships awarded to any single individual during a 4-H year):

When exhibiting for 1-4 days will pay registration fee

When exhibiting for 5-6 days will pay for meal ticket

When 1st place showmanship, 1st place style review, or grand champion still project the

Council will pay a daily meal credit and registration fee for award winning project area

State Shoot – council will pay registration and discipline fees up to \$75 total Showcase

Showdown - council will pay registration up to \$75

Other 4-H camps/trips - council will pay up to \$75

**Additional scholarship funds may be available on an individual as need basis.

Request for additional scholarship must be made in person by youth applicants at a 4-H council meeting.

Eligibility requirements for youth members to receive Johnson County 4-H Council funding for trips or scholarships

Must be a member in good standing of an established JC 4-H Community Club

Must turn in record book by due date for previous 4-H year (Does not apply to first year members)

Must sell and submit on time all required raffle tickets for annual 4-H Carnival Fundraiser

Must participate in any other countywide required 4-H fundraising efforts

**Failure to complete any of these shall result in being billed for amounts paid on your behalf!

Appendix II (for December 20, 2018 adoption)

To the 4-H Council by-laws for clarification of level of support provided by the Johnson County 4-H Council as pertaining to youth sponsorships for attending a National or International 4-H event.

- One full sponsorship to be used for registration and travel expenses (up to \$2,000) for a high school
- One partial sponsorship to be used for registration and travel expenses (up to \$750) for a middle school 4-H youth to attend Leadership Washington Focus (LWF).
- Application to other national 4-H trips are encouraged with sponsorships reviewed case-by-case.

Eligibility requirements for 4-H Youth members to receive JC 4-H Council funding sponsorships:

- Limit of two sponsorships awarded to any single individual, one time as a high school student (CWF) and one time as a middle school student (LWF).
- Must be an enrolled 4-H member in good standing for a minimum of two years.
- Must sell required number of raffle tickets for annual 4-H Carnival Fundraiser.
- Must complete and submit portfolio/record books by due date for prior two years.
- Must formally present how the national 4-H event experience was a benefit during the JC 4-H Achievement Night.
- Must request sponsorship in person at a 4-H Council meeting and submit a written application.
- Sponsorship request and application deadlines shall be due at the 4-H Council meeting immediately preceding the event application deadline. Sponsorship recipients will be notified prior to the national event application deadline as to whether the Council approved their sponsorship.

*A selection committee, as determined by the current executive board, will review the applications and select the youths to receive sponsorship funds. The committee will rank applicants based on the following criteria:

- Applicant has met all above requirements
- Highest score on their previous 4-H year portfolio.
- Date application is received by the UWE Office
- Years in 4-H
- Eligibility age those at the top age for the event.
- Overall quality of written applications and Council meeting request presentation.
- Sponsorship will be granted to those attending a national event for the first time.
- When all above are equal, the Executive Council may make the determination to split the award funds between several applicants.

*Recipients shall pay in advance the cost of a national trip and submit a reimbursement form to the JC 4-H Council to receive reimbursement.

**Disclaimer: These sponsorships will be awarded on a 'JC 4-H Council budget funds allowing' basis.

2018-2019 4-H CLUB CHARTERING

All Johnson County 4-H clubs must renew their club charters at the start of the new 4-H year shortly after October 1st. Chartering is the process by which a group is recognized as an official 4-H club by the UWE. Upon meeting established requirements, a charter is presented to the new 4-H club. Failure to meet club chartering requirements and/or leader certification may *result in the loss of the charter or restrictions placed upon a club*. As of the January 11th 2016, 4-H Council meeting, the motion carried whereby clubs failing to complete chartering prior to December 15th be fined \$100.

4-H Clubs must be officially chartered through the University of Wyoming Extension (UWE) with the 4-H educator responsible for guiding the community club leaders and directing the process.

The established requirements for a 4-H club charter:

- 1. A membership of at least five 4-H members from at least two separate families.
- 2. 4-H club leaders must maintain their UWE 4-H certification active status with a screened volunteer leader to supervise the organizational needs and programs of the club, two are recommended.
- 3. An appropriately structured club utilizing a leadership team of elected youth officers.
- 4. The club and volunteers from the club must be prepared to support the 4-H program above the local club level, i.e. participation in county 4-H council meetings or county development committees.
- 5. A calendar of planned educational activities (i.e. meetings, workshops, community service, etc.).
- 6. Create 4-H club bylaws using the state 4-H template (newly adopted by the state 4-H office in 2017).
- 7. Adherence to JC 4-H Council bylaws.
- 8. Approval of application by the county UWE 4-H educator.
- 9. If the club anticipates raising funds, generating income, or having bank accounts, an Employer Identification Number /Tax Identification Number (EIN/TIN) is a requirement of the IRS.

Each year 4-H clubs shall be evaluated and approved for renewal to continue operating as an official JC community club for the upcoming 4-H year. The following information should be collected for evaluation and renewal:

- The Wyoming 4-H Club Treasurer's Handbook (new in 2017)
 - o Audit by internal committee (adopted in 2017 with four clubs per year for a three year cycle)
 - Working with the 4-H Educator for timely submission of the IRS Form
- The Wyoming 4-H Club Secretary Handbook with club minutes(new in 2017)
- Updated Club Charter Application


