

To the Johnson County 4-H Community,

My end of the year report to the County Commissioners, regarding the JC 4-H program, presented increases in overall programmatic quality and in the numbers of kids enrolled in 2019. JC 4-Hers learned, had fun, and experienced many successes at the county and state levels. We had individuals or teams travel to Wool Judging, 307 Livestock Judging, Showcase Showdown, Atlanta, Arizona, and even as a member of the Wyoming delegation to Ghana. All of these opportunities provided to youth in the JC 4-H program can be attributed to the support from a generous community and tremendous commitment to youth development by our 4-H Executive Council, Fair Board Committees, and adult volunteers. Thanks to all that made 2019 a great 4-H year, we now are in full stride for making an even better 4-H year in 2020.

At the start of a new calendar year, we begin with a renewed sense of optimism and high hopes. The JC 4-H program has experienced increased early enrollments (this may be the year we go over 300). To invite more families into JC 4-H, we are reliant upon community club leaders to welcome additional new members into their club. We are also working to find a leader who would like to start a new community club to provide another place for new members. Increased enrollments in many project areas impacts the 4-H Council's annual budget but the Council still has enabled our project leaders to enhance or expand their project areas. Several project-based workshops have been set with several more being scheduled soon.

To help ensure early success for first time 4-H members and families, I have sent out the 2020 version of the new JC 4-H members handbook to all community club leaders, asking club leaders to share and to welcome new members into their clubs. Research shows that club leaders are the greatest influencer for the best first year 4-H experience and for retention in 4-H by first year members. With new families and members, it is essential for 4-H leaders to welcome and continually communicate with these families new to 4-H to see if their needs are being met.

Johnson County 4-H is all about our kids and positive youth development but sometimes the adults want to play also. Doug Wasinger, Livestock Committee Treasurer, has been brainstorming an opportunity for adults to do more than pace the sidelines during livestock shows. Doug's idea is to get adults competing in a friendly showmanship event, in what he calls the "OVER THE HILL SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST". Included in this issue of the Clover Chatter is a draft notice of what many feel would be good fun and a great way to generate funds for the 4-H Council and Fair Board. Please reach out to Doug, if you have ideas, a desire to sponsor a buckle / awards, or you just have a competitive nature that drives you to get in the showring again.

At upcoming community club meetings and project activities, please set aside time for youth to welcome new members/families. First-year successes are essential for retention, best retention happens when 4-H is FUN!





Performance and responsibility with an internship.

The intern will have the opportunity to observe, learn, and participate with the employee of their choice. The hope is through the internship, the intern can find a career that they may pursue after high school.

Interns will experience as many aspects of their chosen career as possible and work with their employer to learn skills necessary for the job. The professional work force of the intern's choice may be welding, accounting, retail, banking, law, carpentry, and the list goes on. The intern is required to work 100 hours between May 1, 2020 and March 1, 2021. Once timesheets, evaluation forms from employer and intern are turned in to the Johnson County Extension Office (by 03/01/2021) a stipend of \$1,000 will be issued to the intern with no cost to the employer.

This opportunity is available to all Johnson County youth. However, if an internship is awarded, the youth must become a member of 4-H in Johnson County.

#### How to Apply

Step 1: Think of a career you would like to learn more about through real-life experiences.

**Step 2:** Contact a professional or business owner in this field and inquire if they would be interested in having an intern work for them for 100 hours at NO cost to them.

Step 3: Fill out the application, resume, and other required application materials. These may be picked up at the Johnson County Extension Office (30 Fairgrounds Rd Buffalo WY).
