



QUINCY'S CORNER

I would like to thank everyone that came to the 2022 Achievement Night, it was so great to have everyone here in person again. I would also like to thank the volunteers that helped put it all together and the donors that helped out with prizes. There are still prizes here at our office so if your club wasn't able to attend, please swing by and pick them up.

Now looking forward to the New Year... it is that time when we are thinking about our projects for the upcoming show season. As you start to bring your animals home, please consider the following:

-Do you have a biosecurity plan in place? It is important to keep new animals isolated from your other animals for the first couple of weeks to prevent the spread of diseases. Be sure to monitor your animals at this time for illness.



-Does your pen have safe and secure fencing?

-Does your animal have access to a warm shelter, clean, dry bedding, and adequate cover from the sun, rain, wind, and snow? Small animals don't have much fat covering to keep them warm, so it is extra important they have proper shelter.

Since we live in Wyoming, our animals are faced with extremely cold weather conditions. It is important that their shelter provides them with a warm, dry location where they can get out of the wind. Clean your animal's pen daily to ensure their bedding stays clean and dry.

-Have you checked your pens for loose nails, boards, wire, or any other potential hazard? Animals can ingest, get tangled in, or cut by any of these, causing stress and illness. It is important to check pens daily for safety concerns.

-Do you have water containers that can't be tipped over to ensure your animal has water at all times? Even in cold weather animals need constant access to water. Animals also need access to good quality feed, especially during our cold winter months so they can stay warm. Is your animal on a well-balanced feed regimen that will help them maintain body condition and grow? There are many resources to help you decide which feed is best for your animal. Don't be afraid to talk about your options with feed store staff or your 4-H leaders.

-Do you have a relationship with a local veterinarian? It's a good idea to know a vet that you can call with questions or in an emergency. Animals can get sick or injured at any time, having a plan in place could save you from a devastating loss. Only give medications as recommended by your vet. Follow labels and observe the withdrawal times, especially as we get closer to fair.

-Do you know proper animal handling techniques? It is important to keep their stress levels low. Calm, slow, quiet movements are usually most effective.

This booklet by Oregon State 4-H has some great ideas for how to keep your animals healthy and some things to think about before you bring your animals home.



-H Project Success: What steps should I follow?

- 1. Select project areas that interest you.
- 2. Make sure you are signed up in ZSUITE for your chosen projects.
- 3. Come up with a project that will help you reach your learning goals. (For example, if you signed up for Sport Fishing and set the goal of learning new casting techniques. A poster with the steps you took to learn the new techniques would be great for the fair.
- 4. Use 4-H Project Curriculum to help you come up with project ideas and learning goals. 4-H Project Curriculum are "workbooks" that kids can do independently or with an adult mentor. They allow youth to go at their own pace and achieve hands-on learning independently. Curriculum can be checked out from the Natrona County Extension Office or purchased at shop4-h.org.
- 5. Begin work in your 4-H project area. Be sure to keep notes when you work on projects, including when you learned things and what you learned, what didn't go as planned, when you shared your project with someone else, etc. Don't forget to take pictures! Later, these notes can be transferred on to your 4-H Record Book.
- 6. Attend any project workshops that may be held in the project areas that you signed up for. Watch the NC 4-H Facebook page, newsletter, and emails sent out from the Extension Office for more information it always includes details of upcoming 4-H activities that are being offered to 4-H members.
- 7. Remember that you should be completing projects as a way to reach the learning goals you have set for yourself not just making something to bring to the fair.
- 8. Call the 4-H Office for help if you get confused, stuck, or run out of ideas! We'd love to help you with ideas.

Especially for Volunteers...

4-H Youth Development - The Club System

- The 4-H club is the core structure where hands-on learning and teaching take place. An organized group of at least five youth, from at least two different families, meet with adult volunteers. With appropriate guidance from volunteers, club members elect their own officers, decide on programs and plan activities.
- It's entirely up to 4-H members what their 4-H club does! 4-H clubs usually focus on one or more topics of the members' choice.
 They conduct project-related activities, for example, a club may have a year-round garden or a shooting sports club may practice at the range.
 4-H clubs also do lots of community service both in their project area and where they are needed.
- The purpose of 4-H is to promote positive youth development. If club members and volunteers plan a wide variety of learning activities together, everyone has the chance to grow through experiential learning, developing individual skills and abilities, and participating in community service projects.

The 4-H program year runs October 1 through the following September. Membership in Wyoming 4-H is open to all youth ages 8-18 (age as of January 1), regardless of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, marital status, disability, or public assistance. Children ages 5-7 can participate with selected age-appropriate activities through the Cloverbud program.

4-H Club Meetings That Youth Choose to Attend

A 4-H Club is a great venue for learning, group interaction and fun to take place. The meeting environment and meeting components are important aspects to consider when creating a club that youth choose to attend.

4-H Club Meeting Environment: The Environment of a club meeting includes all of the things that make people feel comfortable when they attend.

- Location and Room Set Up: Is your meeting in an easy location to find and get to? If it is not near an outside door, are there signs to guide people? Is the room comfortable? There are a number of ways to set up the room to facilitate your meeting. If you want better discussion, consider putting the chairs in a circle or horseshoe. This arrangement facilitates conversation/business, and the 4-H members can see each other which will help them get to know one another. The members are more apt to stay attentive throughout the meeting as it is more difficult to withdraw or space out without being noticed.
- Making Families Feel Welcome: Greeting people when they first enter the room is a way of making people feel welcome. It can be intimidating to go into a place where you do not know anyone, so that greeting can break the ice. Likewise, even for current member families it is nice to be greeted when you walk in the door. Nametags are a great idea to help people get acquainted. It helps everyone learn names. Clip on nametags for all members and their parents could be in the meeting supply box.
- New Families: May not know the 4-H Pledge, the 4-H Motto or even the procedure that is followed at a 4-H club meeting. Consider
 a "Greet Sheet" with some of those basic instructions. Also consider putting signs or banner up in the meeting room to help with the
 pledge, motto, agenda...
- Getting People Involved Right Away: If a family arrives a little early, what is there to do while they wait? What kinds of things can
 you have going on prior to club meetings to promote and encourage people being on time? IDEAS Judging classes, puzzles, games,
 worksheets, learning centers, project displays, a sign in sheet or sign-up poster for future activities.

2023 EGG DESIGN Submission Call

Presented by America's Egg Farmers

For over 40 years, the First Lady of the United States is presented with a beautifully decorated Commemorative Easter Egg by America's egg farmers to celebrate Easter. To mark the 2022 Easter season, all 40 eggs presented to past First Ladies were displayed in a special exhibit.

During the 2023 Easter season, a new exhibit will feature decorated eggs from each U.S. state/territory designed by kids across the country. We are calling on parents with kids aged 5-18 to design an egg under the theme of "United States of Possibility" that represents their home U.S. state or territory. Here's how parents can help their child get involved:

Design and Entry Submission Process

- 1. Download the PDF included in the submission form, and use the template provided to have your child create his/her own egg design and corresponding design inspiration statement explaining your child's vision behind the idea. The design statement should be no longer than 50 words in length.
- 2. Your child should embrace his/her personal artistic style be bold, fun, and unique. Your child can use any medium of choice (crayons, watercolors, paint, etc.) for the egg design. Art should be your child's original creation, and not feature assets from third parties (unless in the public domain). Anything not original or not in the public domain may not be included in any entries.
- **3.** Fully complete the submission form, including your contact information and your child/artist's full name, so you can be contacted if your child's egg design is selected.
- **4.** Upload your child's submission, including your child's egg design, to the submission portal at www.incredibleegg.org/unitedstatesofpossibility by 11:59:59 PM ET on Saturday, December 31, 2022.
- **5.** The American Egg Board selection committee will review all submissions and select one egg design per state/territory, which is expected to serve as inspiration for a unique exhibit during Easter 2023.
- **6.** Parents of selected egg design submissions will be notified by March 10, 2023, and selected egg designs will be created by egg artists across the country for a special exhibit, as determined by sponsor and artist in their sole discretion.

United States of Possibility Theme - How to Get Started Your Child Started Each U.S. state and territory is special. From the mountain ranges of Washington to farmlands of Iowa to beaches in Florida, our different locations combined make up a diverse and united country and give us a special sense of local and national pride. So how can our differences contribute to the future of the United States?

This is the United States of Possibility. What role will your individual state or territory play in the next 5, 10 or 15 years? What are some special aspects that you think will contribute to our country's unity? We're looking for egg designs that show how your state/territory might make a difference in the future of our country. Consider your home's unique natural resources, scientific and technological inventions or cultural developments in the arts, sports or film. Then put it into an egg design...

Here are some questions to ask your child when thinking about their egg design:


- · What is the thing I love most about my state or territory?

- 1. The 4H/FFA Contest will take place Tuesday, January 10th, 2023 and will begin at 12:00pm. Contestants should report to the Albany County Fairgrounds between 11:15am and 11:45am.
- 2. There will be NO COACHES MEETING
- 3. A practice will be held from 12:00pm 6:00pm on Monday, January 9th, 2023, at the LREC Wool Lab. At least 1 rail and 2 classes will be provided.
- 4. Each County/Chapter may enter a maximum of <u>two</u> Wool Judging Teams comprised of a maximum of four (4) members and a minimum of three (3) members. The scores of the three (3) high scoring individuals on each team will be totaled for the team score.
- 5. Each County/Chapter may enter an unlimited number of alternates not designated as part of that County/Chapter's team(s). Alternates will be eligible for individual awards, but not team awards.
- 6. Eligibility:
 - a. Wool judging contestants cannot enter the floor of the judging area prior to the contest.
 - b. Only officials of the contest will be allowed on the floor area of the contest. All others are required to have the permission of the Superintendent to enter the contest area.

- c. 4H and FFA will not be split into two separate contests and will compete for the same team and individual awards.
- d. Contestants will be split into 3 divisions: Junior, Intermediate, Senior/FFA.
 - i. Junior: between 8-10 years of age as of December 31st, 2022.
 - ii. Intermediate: between 11-13 years of age as of December 31st, 2022.
 - iii. Senior: between 14-18 years of age as of December 31st, 2022, or a participating as an FFA member.

7. The Contest will be judged as follows

- a. Classes: Ten (10) minutes will be allowed for the placing of each class of four (4) fleeces. Contestants will be asked to stand back one minute at the beginning and one minute at the end of the class to observe.
 - i. Three (3) classes of breed fleeces. Fleeces to be placed on the basis of breed requirements.
 - ii. Three (3) classes of commercial fleeces. Fleeces to be placed according to commercial requirements.


b. Reasons/Questions

- i. Seniors/Intermediates: Two (2) sets of oral reasons will be given from 2 of the classes listed above; each set is worth up to 50 points.
- ii. Juniors/Intermediates: Two (2) sets of questions will be asked on 2 of the classes listed above; each set is worth up to 50 points.
- iii. Intermediates can choose whether to participate in the reasons or questions portions of the contest.
- c. Grading Rail: Fifteen (15) fleeces will be scored for grade (spinning counts), length, character, purity and yield. A maximum of forty-five (45) minutes will be allowed: (2) minutes per fleece and eight (8) minutes to re-examine any or all of the fifteen (15) fleeces. Contestants will submit their findings on an official grading sheet at the end of the rail. The Grading Rail is worth up to 300 points.
- d. A tie or ties for High Team or High Individual (overall) will be broken on the fifteen (15) fleece grading rail. Placing ties will be

broken by reasons and total scores will break grading ties. Reasons will be broken on the lowest placing score, then on grading.

- e. 4H scantrons will be used.
- 8. Supplies: Scantrons will be provided. Students should supply a clipboard (with no measurement/rulers), pencils and blank paper.
- 9. Cheating will not be tolerated; contestants may be disqualified for cheating. From the time the contest begins to the time the contest is officially complete, there will be no conferring between contestants. Cell phones, smart watches and other smart devices are prohibited. All supplies the student brings must be blank.
- 10. Contestants are warned against rough handling of contest fleeces. Any contestant who violates this rule will be asked to place the remainder of the classes without handling. No warning will be given.
- 11. Coaches will not be allowed to see the classes until after the official judges begin to hear contestant reasons.

4-H CARNIVAL TIME

Why do we have a Carnival? The Carnival is the biggest fund raiser the 4-H Council has each year to help raise funds so our members can enjoy clinics, prizes at the County Fair, educational supplies and trips. The list goes on and on.

Why do we make Carnival posters? What better way to announce the Carnival to the public, than showing our members artistic talent and let everyone know that we are getting ready to host the biggest Carnival held in our county each year. These posters will be displayed in a variety of businesses all over Natrona

County. Posters need to be turned in by January 25, 2023 @ 4:30pm to be considered for awards for the Carnival poster contest. Entries are allowed in all age groups including cloverbud and adults. If you have a business where you would like to display your poster, you can pick up your poster on February 23rd.

STEPS TO AN AWESOME CARNIVAL POSTER

- 1. On the back of your poster, write your first and last name, your 4-H age (age of December 31, 2022), your club name. Indicate if you will be picking up your poster to deliver and where it will be displayed.
- 2. Use a piece of scratch paper and make a rough draft before you begin creating your poster.
- 3. Get the wording done first on your poster, write large enough for people to read it, but don't take up the entire poster for your wording.
- 4. Lay out your poster pieces so you can move things around before you start gluing.
- 5. Be NEAT, creative, colorful and original.
- 6. What do we want to tell people on this poster? Be sure your poster includes the following information:
 - a. This year's theme is a theme: "A Little Bit of Everything".
 - b. The date for the Carnival is Saturday, March 11, 2023.
 - c. The time for the Carnival is 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.
 - d. The location of the Carnival is the Industrial Building on the Fairgrounds.
 - e. You can list some of the things that are happening that day: games, lunch, prizes, cake walk, bake sale, raffles and door prizes are just a few.
- 7. Decorating your poster is very important, an eye catching poster will make people stop and read. People will not take the time to read one that is too cluttered and busy with the writing too small.
- 8. This year's theme is "A Little Bit of Everything". What decorations or artwork can you create to go along with the theme? Be creative, look around your house, you can use old wrapping paper to make letters or find some pictures you can cut out and glue on. Puffy paint to fill in balloon lettering is always unique. Try to stay away from too much glitter, it doesn't always stick well and makes a mess wherever the poster is hung.
- 9. Try to keep your poster fairly flat. A 3-D effect is nice, but it's hard to find places to display them.
- 10. Making posters is fun, be sure to relax, and enjoy creating your unique poster.


