THANK YOU NOTES

Why It Is Important To Write THANK-YOU Notes

There is value in a handwritten thank you note. If someone does something for you or gives you a gift, traditionally a note of thanks is sent to the giver to express your gratitude. You may be thinking "well this is 2023 and times have changed." Yes, times have changed. We have Facebook, email, cellphones and texting literally at our fingertips just about 24/7. It's so easy to call, email or send a text with an emoji expressing thanks, however it just isn't the same as receiving a note "in the mail". The conveniences of technology are really no excuse for not handwriting (yes on paper!) a note to express your gratitude. Surely, as you read this you are asking why. Well, a thank you note may seem like a small thing, but it carries a big message of appreciation and gratitude more than any text ever has. There is something old-fashioned and especially heartfelt about writing it down by hand for both the writer and the recipient.

Receiving a tangible piece of snail mail says to its recipient, "I am thinking about you, and I am thankful for you. Here is the handwritten proof." So, here are 10 Reasons Why You SHOULD Write Thank You Notes:

- 1. It is always the right thing to do.
- 2. It can make the difference in getting the scholarship or getting the job or the client or future donations.
- 3. It sets you apart.
- 4. Gratitude is good for the brain. Some studies have shown it also reduces aches and pains and has other health benefits. (Pers Individ Dif. 2013 Jan;54(1):92-96).
- 5. It will make someone's day! Having a handwritten letter amongst a pile of bills and junk mail is heartwarming.
- 6. It is an opportunity to reflect on our gratitude and appreciate the time and energy someone put in to do something nice on our behalf.
- 7. It serves as a keepsake - no one typically saves an email or a text but a letter, definitely!
- 8. It perpetuates an important part of our culture and contributes to a lost art.
- 9. It shows you to be a thoughtful and appreciative person.
- 10. It lets the giver know that you did indeed receive their gift.



HOW TO WRITE A THANK YOU CARD

· Dear [Name of person].

If "Dear" sounds too formal to you and you know the person well, you can get away with "Hi", as in "Hi Michelle!"

Thank you for the [description of gift] [name of gift].

Example: Thank you for the fuzzy brown scarf.

 At least one sentence about the item; something you did with it, a reason you like it, when you plan to use it.

Ideally, make the sentence 2 parts, like the example below. This makes the note feel more sincere.

For example: It matches many of my clothes and I know I'll use it on my trip to Iceland.

 Tell the giver you appreciate the thought or time they put into it and the occasion for which the gift was given.

Example: It was so thoughtful of you to think of me on my birthday.

Sign off.

"Love" is fine for family members and close friends.

For others, some choices are "Yours Truly", "Regards", or "Warm Regards".

· Sign your name.

Don't make this an autograph scrawl; neaten it up so you they know it's you.

That's it! Hopefully this thank you card template made things a little easier for you. Learning how to write a thank you note is not as exhausting as you may have thought. Once you know how to write a couple of sentences that truly express your feelings, you'll find it's a piece of cake to crank out those thank you notes. And you'll feel good that your gift-giver knows you really mean it.

NEW THIS YEAR! Animal Drug Testing:

NEW for 2023, the Wyoming State Fair will be drug testing Swine, Beef, Goats and Sheep. For these market species, drug testing will be mandatory for the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion award winners and two randomly selected market animals from each species.

Why: At the Wyoming State Fair we value education, animal welfare, protecting the food chain, and fostering fair competition. Drug testing is a valuable tool to help exhibitors and families to understand the possible implications of using substances on their animal.

How: By 12 pm on opening day of the 2023 Wyoming State Fair, exhibitors MUST turn in their drug declaration forms to the Exhibitor Office drop box ONE FORM IS REQUIRED PER MARKET ANIMAL. Drug Declaration forms can be found at wystatefair.com or picked up at the Exhibitor Office.





What is the State 4-H Leadership Team?

The State 4-H Leadership team is a select team of senior aged youth that have demonstrated leadership in their county 4-H programs, and who are interested in developing and refining skills to teach other 4-H youth about leadership, promotion, and service. Team members will also work on events/projects pertaining to their project area of choice.

Who can apply for the State 4-H leadership Team?

Current Wyoming 4-H members ages 15-18, that are in good-standing in their County 4-H program, who enjoy taking leadership opportunities and having a positive impact on Wyoming 4-H and their project area.

Why should you apply for the State 4-H Leadership Team?

The State 4-H Leadership Team provides opportunities for youth to represent Wyoming 4-H through leadership and service at all statewide events and activities including state leadership team retreat, Showcase Showdown, Legislative Day, State Shoot, and the Wyoming State Fair. Team members are also involved in providing county or multi-county leadership workshops, assisting at all state 4-H contents and events, and representing 4-H at organizational meetings. Team members will also be provided an opportunity to focus on a project or event related to their project area of choice. This provides new opportunities for youth to become leaders for their projects at a state level.
