


CLOVERBUDS

The 4-H Cloverbuds Program in the University of Wyoming's 4-H program is a non-formal education program designed for children ages 5-7. Participation, safety, personal development, learning and fun are the highest priorities for Cloverbuds programs. Cloverbuds is designed to introduce young people to cooperative learning and the many things they can do in 4-H. These programs are adult led, activity-focused, and are built on cooperative learning rather than competition. There are two different Cloverbud clubs that meet in Upton and Newcastle.

We know Wyoming kids have a heart for helping; we also know you're never too young to join the fight against food insecurity.














83,000 of our neighbors struggle with food insecurity. Fair to Fork is making a difference.



Sign up for the lottery through your local University of Wyoming Extension Office or scan the QR code.

















FAIR EXHIBITS

What is the difference between a 4-H project and a 4-H exhibit? Each year, 4-H members enroll in project areas that interest them. They set goals to plan what they will learn in each project area. When they bring things to fair to show what they learned, these are called exhibits.

Members choose projects when they enroll in 4-H in ZSuite. Fair Entries are entered into FairEntry prior to the fair entry deadline - July 3rd! Just because you are enrolled in 4-H in ZSuite does not mean that you are entered for fair!

Once you have decided what you are going to bring to County Fair you'll need to do a few things.

Step 1: Log in to FairEntry.com and create your entries for your exhibits

Step 2: Prepare your exhibits for fair - each project is a little different - your market lamb preparations look very different than your chocolate chip cookie preparation!

Step 3: Bring your exhibits to Fair at the appropriate time

Static Exhibits (things like foods and nutrition, photography, etc.) are due to the Fairgrounds on Tuesday of Fair from 9:00 am - 7:00 PM

Fabric and Fashion Exhibits are due to be judged on July 15th

Livestock comes in according to species during Fair week

SKILL STATEMENTS

- Skill statements need to be completed for each static exhibit that you are bringing to fair
- Skill Statements are REQUIRED for a static exhibit to go to State Fair
 - At State Fair this is the only information the judge has about your project since there is not Interview Judging. The more information you provide the better!
- Use the following form or create your own that includes all of the information requested
- Preparing your skill statement ahead of county fair is a great way to prepare for your interview judging at Fair

Interview Judging

It is important to remember that an interview is a conversation between you and the judge to discuss and evaluate the exhibit you have completed. It is meant to be an educational experience for you, the 4-H member; an opportunity to practice communication and interview skills that you will be use in the future. When participating in interview judging, 4-H'ers should dress appropriately. You should be clean and neat. Speak clearly and look the judge in the eye. No gum, candy or other things should be in your mouth.

When you sit down...

- Smile and introduce yourself to the judge
- Tell the judge how many years you have been in 4-H or how many years you have been doing welding, baking, electronics, etc. (whatever project you are currently getting judged).
- Tell the judge about your exhibit.
- Give the judge some time to look over and examine your project.
- The judge may then start to ask you some questions....

Questions a judge might ask you...

- Tell me about your exhibit. How did you do it (processes, steps, plans)? Did you experiment with different techniques?
- Where did you find the information/idea/pattern for your exhibit? Did you make any changes to what you found to show your own creativity?
- Did your project turn out as you planned? If not, how is it different?
- What new things did you learn? How will you use what you learned for your projects next year?
- What did you do best?
- What was the most difficult/easiest part of completing this exhibit?
- What caused you the most problems with your exhibit?
- How much time did this exhibit take to create?
- Did you have any help to do this? Could you do it again on your own?
- Would you do this project again? If so, what might you do? Would you do anything differently - changes or improvements next time?
- Why did you choose to make this exhibit?
- What do you plan to do with this exhibit after the fair?
- What did you learn about yourself?
- What did you learn about your exhibit?
- What did you learn about your 4-H project?

- What would have happened if. . . .?
- How can you use what you learned from this project?
- What are some ideas or goals you might like to strive for next year?

The judge may share knowledge and skills that would be meaningful to the 4-H'er such as ways to improve the exhibit. 4-H members can prepare for the interview by reviewing their exhibit, steps that they took to make it and by looking over the above questions so that they are ready to answer the questions that the judge may ask. You may be teaching the judge how to do a new technique so explain how you created your exhibit.

Interview judging of projects in 4-H merely means that the 4-H member and the adult or judge have the opportunity to go over the article to be evaluated. Together they decide how much progress has been made or in what ribbon classification it should be placed.

Remember to practice your interview with your parents and grandparents before you come in front of the judge.

THE DANISH SYSTEM OF JUDGING

Exhibiting is part of 4-H educational experiences.

Judging is based on comparison to a standard, not on comparison to others in the class.


Judges may consider skill level based on age and circumstance, and expect a higher performance from older 4-H'ers, so there is some variance within the standard.

Award groups are as follows:

- **Purple Ribbon** Excellent quality. Usually reserved for top two or three of the group, but not limited in number given.
- Blue Ribbon Superior quality. The standards have been met. Denotes adequate work.
- **Red Ribbon** Average to above average quality. Shows signs of quality, but does not completely meet the standards. Some areas need further improvement.
- White Ribbon Below average quality. Does not meet standards. Denotes improvement needed.

- 1. Thank you notes will be required for all animals sold in the Junior Livestock Sale. An addressed, stamped thank you note for each buyer or add-on donor must be turned in to the Extension Office before your sale check will be mailed.
- 2. All sale checks will be mailed on September 1, 2025 (if thank you notes have been received)
- 3. A mandatory livestock exhibitor meeting will be held on Wednesday, July 30th at 1:00 PM at the show ring. All exhibitors are asked to attend.
- 4. A short bio will be required for all youth with livestock in the sale. Bios will be due to Erin by noon on Friday of Fair.
- 5. Sale brochures will be available for youth to distribute to possible buyers. Please take the time to invite a few buyers to the sale. A packet of information was mailed to you in June.
